



LENT'S SPIRITUAL DESERT

1st Sunday of Lent

"Lent is a new beginning, a path leading to the certain goal of Easter, Christ's victory over death. This season urgently calls us to conversion. Christians are asked to return to God 'with all their hearts' (Joel 2:12), to refuse to settle for mediocrity and grow in friendship with the Lord." ~Pope Francis

This Sunday's Gospel tells us that the Holy Spirit led Jesus into the desert to be tempted. The desert is not only a physical place, but also a psychological state of loneliness, trials, and temptations. It is the place where man finds out the truth about himself and encounters God. It is also the place where Jesus was victorious over the Devil and shows us who He is: our Lord and our God.

Every year the Church enters into the season of Lent to remind us that every day we are presented with the choice to either avoid or choose sin, which ultimately lead to eternal life or death. We are constantly tempted by power, glory, and pleasure. We are tempted to eat that extra piece of cake, to watch the next episode (when we could pray instead), to be afraid in the face of crises and natural disasters, and to yell when we could practice patience. We are tempted to choose death. For this reason, we need God and His grace.

What is most important during this Lenten Season is to remember that Jesus is Our Lord Who knows exactly what we experience. If we really desire to be faithful to God and ask Him for His help, then He will give us the strength to confront and overcome daily trials and temptations. He will give us the grace we need to be like Him: holy. He will assist us in choosing life.

As we enter into the spiritual desert of Lent, let us spend time in silence in order to listen to God's voice, reflect on our lives. Let us also take this opportunity to ask ourselves: For whom do I live? For what do I long? Hopefully the answers to those questions are: Jesus Christ and eternal life. If they are not, let us ask the Lord for His grace so that we can turn our spiritual situation around.

Today is the first Sunday of Lent – it's a time for us to focus on our relationship with God - where our Lenten Journey with Jesus Christ will take us this year. Based on current events in our world, there is certainly a need for that.

This past holiday weekend was marred by further shooting and killings in Chicago and throughout our country. There is a great need to let God in our life.

But how do we do that? As I pondered that question, I was reminded of an old familiar tune.

"Let there be peace on earth..."

Many of you probably remember that song from years gone by. It's usually thought of as a "Christmas Season" song, but the message is important every day of our lives. (For those who are unfamiliar with it, it is available on YouTube.)

The message is that **peace** comes from God to all of us. We must let God's peace into our hearts - then we are called to share God's peace with all in our lives. That message is very apparent in today's gospel, as Jesus shows us the way.

The Temptations

In Mathew's gospel, Jesus is led by the Holy Spirit to be tempted by the devil. For 40 days and 40 nights Jesus fasted, and afterwards He was hungry (a tremendous understatement).

The devil's *first temptation* was for Jesus to "turn the stones into loaves of bread. Jesus responds that we "live not by bread alone, but every word that comes from the mouth of God." The **second temptation**, the devil takes Jesus to the highest point of the temple and tells Jesus to throw Himself down, for God will save Him. Jesus responds, "You shall not put God to the test." The third temptation the devil tells Jesus to worship him. Jesus responds, "Get away Satan, God alone shall you worship and serve."

Through these temptations Jesus show us that God is with each one of us as we journey through life.

God is with us every step of our life. We forget this sometimes; but Lent is a time for us to focus on the message to

trust in God always.

The temptations and Jesus' response are relevant to us today - in our world. For example: With the first temptation, do we eat and drink to maintain good health; or do we overindulge food and drink while millions of less fortunate go hungry? With the second temptation, do we pray for the miraculous intervention of God in our career, health, etc. for our self-benefit; or do we willingly accept the will of God? The *third temptation* focuses on lusting after the riches and influence of the world; rather than accepting and thanking God for what we have and sharing with others.

" and let it begin with me."

If we want peace on earth, it needs to start with us. Too often we look at Lent as a time to suffer. We make sacrifices and adjustments in our life. There's a solemn tone of repentance to Lent, but Lent is also a joyful time of developing a deeper, more meaningful relationship with God. We should not focus only on the "giving up" side, it's also a time for us to develop a more meaningful relationship with God.

If we enter into our Lenten season eager to improve our relationship with God, our Lenten Journey will be a joyous celebration.

In closing, I would like to share a few lines from the "Ministry of Praise" Prayer for January:

"Loving Father, open our hearts to hidden realities: your love for all people, your call to justice and peace.

Christ Jesus, help us to imitate your example: healing the sick, welcoming the stranger, assisting the poor and vulnerable.

Holy Spirit, make visible to our eyes what is invisible: your call to your people, your summons to live our faith daily as witnesses of justice and peace. May the sacraments move us to engage in love-inspired action that transforms us and the world.

For the many times Emmy needed some type of blood product and it was there for Emmy, her family would like to give back. In true Emmy spirit, this blood drive is a way that Emmy can continue to help others.



Eucharistic Revival – What is it?

You may have seen this statistic - In 2019, a study by the Pew Research Center reported that only a third of Catholics believe the Eucharist is the real Body and Blood of Christ. Maybe we shouldn't be surprised by this information given the full complexity of the Eucharist - that through the power and grace of God, the bread and wine is transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ. This very real presence of Christ begins at the moment of consecration and endures until it is consumed.

To help Catholics not only better understand the Real Presence of Christ but to develop a deeper love for the Eucharist, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) has established a National Eucharistic Revival. This is a multi year effort involving catechesis (knowing about God) and evangelization (knowing and loving God). This effort began in July of 2022 at the National Level and will move throughout this year to the Diocesan level and then to the Parish level.

As part of this Revival, I recently attended a Symposium for the Diaconate sponsored by the Diocese of Joliet and the Archdiocese of Chicago. We heard from Cardinal Blase Cupich, Bishop Ron Hicks, Bishop Bob Lombardo, and Bishop Daniel Conlon. The overall message was that this is not just about understanding what takes place during the liturgy of the Eucharist, rather that our Church and the world needs healing. One way to accomplish this is to renew the church from the inside-out through an ever-deepening appreciation of the Eucharist.




LOOKING FOR SOME RINGERS

Did you know that people who have close relationships at home, work or in their community tend to be healthier and live longer? One reason, according to the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute (NHLBI), is that we're more successful at meeting our health goals when we join forces with others.

Trying to keep your heart healthy?

Joining forces with friends or family may keep you more motivated.

Follow these heart healthy lifestyle tips with your friends, family, coworkers, and others in your community and you'll all be heart healthier for it:

Move More: Invite members of your faith community to join you in your efforts to be more physically active. For example, walk together on a regular basis or join an exercise class at your local community center.

Aim for a healthy weight: Find someone in your faith community who also wants to reach or maintain a healthy weight. Do healthy activities together, like walking or playing on a neighborhood sports team. Share low-calorie, low -sodium meals or recipes.

Quit smoking: To help you quit, ask others for support or join a support group. Research shows that people are much more likely to guit if their spouse, friend, or sibling does.

Manage stress: Join with a friend or family member to do a relaxing activity every day, like walking, yoga, or meditation, or participate in a stress management program together.

Improve sleep: Family members and friends: remind each other to turn off the screen and stick to a regular bedtime. Instead of watching TV before bed, relax by listening to music, reading, or taking a bath.

Track your heart health stats together: Keeping a log of your blood pressure, weight goals, physical activity, and if you have diabetes, your blood sugars, will help you stay on a heart healthy track. Ask your friends or family to join you in the effort.

Grigor Narekatsi, born near the turn of the first millennium, was an Armenian mystical and lyrical poet, monk, and theologian. He has the distinction of being venerated as a saint in the Armenian Apostolic and Catholic Churches and was declared a doctor of the church by Pope Francis in 2015. The prayer book of Gregory of Narek is a fixture in religious Armenian homes, second only to the Bible, and is considered a masterpiece of Christian spiritual literature. It has been translated into 30 languages, including English. Given the rave reviews, consider this writer-saint for your next read!

Get on board for justice

Today marks the 98th death anniversary of Homer Plessy, the man who attempted to end segregation with his legendary ride on a whites-only streetcar in New Orleans in 1892. His efforts were unsuccessful, and the following seven decades of U.S. jurisprudence included segregation as a bedrock feature. Plessy, however, is much less heralded for the fact that he was a man of faith, a black Catholic whose famous ride was organized by an interracial activist group known as the Comité des Citoyens (Citizens' Committee). Their holy disobedience was one of the first Catholic-led efforts against the

developing hierarchy of racism in the formerly French and Spanish regions of the Deep South. May the courage of Plessy and his allies be of use to us today as we continue the march toward justice.

Store up treasure in heaven

Saint Katharine Drexel was born in Philadelphia in 1858 to a wealthy family. The Drexels had a reputation for generosity, reportedly opening their home several days a week to feed and care for people in need. They also made time every day to pray together. During a trip to Europe as a young woman, Katharine was able to have an audience with Pope Leo XIII. She asked the Holy Father to send missionaries to Wyoming. He answered, "Why don't you go?" Not long after, Katharine stunned society by leaving behind her privileged life to dedicate herself to religious life. She worked to improve living conditions and educational opportunities for African Americans and Native Americans. She left a legacy far greater than her family fortune.

Short but sweet sainthood

Lenten inspiration can come from anywhere—from scripture to Instagram, from saints to young people. While not a Bible figure or social media influencer, 15th-century Casimir of Poland happens to fit the categories of both saint and young person. Saint Casimir was a prince who was under intense pressure from his family and country to take a leading role in government and politics. But Casimir felt called to focus on prayer, study, and care for people in need. Although he had to contend with some very disappointed people, he stood firm in his decision to follow his calling. Disease cut short his life at the tender age of 25, but his example can inspire us to live out our calling and thus help fulfill his.

GOSPEL MEDITATION:

February 26, 2023 1st Sunday of Lent

The Spirit leads Jesus into the desert to be tempted by the devil, and we hear this: "He fasted for forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was hungry." Seems like a questionable battle preparation plan. When I fast, I usually feel grouchy at best, and at worst, like I might pass out from longing for a hamburger. Isn't it better to be well-fed and fully hydrated, especially to face spiritual struggles? Why fast?

This might help. The origin of the word "fast" means to "hold firmly." We still use it that way when we say, "I held fast to my original decision." We human beings are a bundle of desires which vie for our attention: food, drink, comfort, safety, sex, laughter, beauty, and so on. If we can't manage to have firm grip on them, in short order they'll have a firm grip on us. By fasting from our lower desires, we learn to firmly grip on to what is greater. Fasting leads to us to a firmer hold on our body and mind.

Jesus fasts for us. He's showing us that his grace can help us regain this firm hold of our lives, which makes it more difficult for the devil to tempt us. But take it one more step. Fasting also teaches us to finally hold fast to Jesus, the Word of God in flesh. "Man does not live by bread alone," he says, "But by every word that comes forth from the mouth of God." Jesus' fasting reveals his fast hold to the Father in everything. May our fasting help us to grasp ourselves more firmly, and then to hold fast to Jesus alone.
