Contractors stepped up their work and, on Christmas Eve, Father O'Hara, the Altar Committee and a squad of Holy Name men transformed the large dusty school room into a beautiful church. The first mass was indeed celebrated on December 25, 1953 – just seven short months after ground was broken!

portant to me to start my faith journey for our future. I came into the RCIA group with an open mind and willingness to learn the Catholic faith.

Through pursuing the Catholic Sacraments, I have found my relationship with God and a new purpose in life. I have been welcomed with open arms into the OLW community and will be forever grateful to have met Deacon Paul, Carol and the rest of the RCIA group. Time spent in prayer and theological reflection with these individuals has been instrumental in my journey to God's love. I feel blessed to continue a lifetime of learning Catholicism and sharing the mystery of faith with those around me.



The second sacrament of initiation is **First Holy Communion**. First Holy Communion is considered one of the holiest and most important occasions in our lives because it is the first time that we receive the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. The Holy Eucharist refers to Christ's body, blood, soul and divinity - truly present in the consecrated bread and wine. Holy Communion unites us to Jesus - which is the entire purpose of our lives!

As Catholics, we know that the Holy Eucharist is the source and summit of our faith: Pope Francis has called it the "Sacrament of Love". For children who are preparing to receive their First Holy Communion, this is a big deal. And for all of us, every single time we receive Our Lord in the Holy Eucharist, it should always be a big deal. What makes it so special the first time is the same thing that makes it special every time!

What makes it so special? Holy Communion is necessary for a healthy spiritual life; without it we are not fully united to Christ and cannot live a life fully immersed in His love. Jesus comes to us in a very unique way in the Eucharist - we physically receive him into our body and our soul. This sacrament is very beautiful, personal, and intimate and we should never take it for granted. Additionally, Holy Eucharist is the only sacrament of initiation that we can, and are encouraged to, receive daily.

There are special graces that God gives us whenever we participate in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, the Eucharist.

Holy Communion deepens our union with Christ. When we receive Communion, we are saying to Jesus Christ, "Here I am. Here is my life. Do with it what You will." We surrender our entire selves to Him, and He surrenders Himself to us. Receiving Holy Communion can transform us so that we become more and more like Christ.

**Holy Communion separates us from sin.** The Eucharist cleanses us of venial sin and strengthens us against temptation. If we are united to Christ, He will heal us of past sins and guard us in His love.

Holy Communion strengthens our charity. Holy Communion strengthens the bonds of charity within us—and by "charity," the Church means the complete, self-emptying love of Christ. When we are united to Christ, we are also united to one another. By receiving Communion, we allow God to work His will into our hearts and lives and we become better brothers and sisters to one another.

Most children receive their First Holy Communion when they are 7 or 8 years old, or in second grade. Preparation for this sacrament is a two-year process that begins in first grade and culminates at the end of second grade. This preparation also includes First Reconciliation which takes place prior to First Holy Communion. There is not a separate rite for First Holy Communion, rather it takes place within the liturgy.

First Holy Communion is, without question, a time of great joy. The saints in heaven, who are delighted to intercede for us, are celebrating along with your family. The boy or girl preparing for this sacrament is going to be profoundly united with Jesus in a way that they never have before!

St. Mother Teresa said the following: "Jesus has made Himself the Bread of Life to give us life. Night and day, He is there. If you really want to grow in love, come back to the Eucharist..."

#### **Second Pillar: Fasting**

**Fasting.** During Lent, we "give things up" not to torture ourselves, but to free ourselves! By sacrificing things we find pleasurable, we are paying attention to unhealthy attachments, and seeking healthier options.

**Family sacrifice.** Consider choosing a 'family sacrifice,' like no screen time on Fridays. This is in addition to your individual sacrifices. Keeping up with a family sacrifice will provide all family members with many hidden graces.

Offer acts of faith. If your faith life is stale or stagnant, instead of giving up something commit to praying every day instead. Our sacrifices should come from love, not a sense of guilt or obligation.

Social media. Here's another challenge: don't announce your sacrifices on social media. By making your sacrifices privately and without recognition, you are practicing many virtues:



generosity, self-control, love, and humility.



# **Traveling With Kids? Read This First**

Hitting the road or taking to the skies with children can feel overwhelming. Lots of planning and preparation is usually involved in a successful trip with kids.



If travel is in your future, Dr. Markeita Moore, a pediatrician with Advocate Children's Medical Group, offers these tips to make for a smoother journey.

- If your child is nervous about traveling, talk them through the method of travel and what they can expect along the way. Bring a calming sensory toy like a pop it or motion tubes.
- Snacks, snacks and more snacks! Come prepared with plenty of water and snacks. You never know if delays will occur.
- Consider catching a red eye. This is sometimes better for smaller children, who typically become sleepy by the time you sit down on the plane.
- Keep any medication in a personal item that fits under the seat in front of you. This allows for accessibility and guarantees you will have it with you when you need it.
- If you have an iPad, download your child's favorite movie, episodes of a show or music ahead of time. And don't forget the kid-friendly headphones so they can enjoy en route.
- If you are traveling by plane, and depending on your child's age, give them a pacifier, bottle, sippy cup or gum during takeoff and landing to help mitigate ear popping.
- Remember kids will make noise and may cry. That is normal! Don't feel bad if your child talks, cries or even becomes irritated. Try your best to remain calm and comfort them. Kids can sense our energy.

"Traveling with your kids is a great opportunity for everyone to have fun, but there is always the potential for hiccups and last-minute changes," says Dr. Moore. "Stay calm and flexible as much as possible. Focus on making memories and enjoying the ride."

#### Hints of resurrection

While the Hebrew scripture written before Jesus lived doesn't explicitly speak of resurrection in the same way it is spoken of after Jesus is raised from the dead, there are certainly rumors and whispers. Perhaps the most explicit references are in chapter 37 of Ezekiel, where God, working through the prophet, raises a valley of dry bones to new life and promises to restore them to the promised land after their captivity in Babylon centuries before Christ. Saint Jerome called the vision of the valley of bones a "simile" of the Resurrection to come. There's hope for these old bones yet!

#### A profile in courage

In the last week of Women's History Month, here's another Catholic woman who made history: Servant of God Catherine de Hueck Doherty (1896-1985). Born wealthy in Russia, she escaped the Russian Revolution and fled to Canada. During the Great Depression, she founded Friendship House, a Catholic outreach movement to serve the poor and promote interracial friendship—a movement that started in Toronto and spread to Harlem, Chicago, Washington D.C., and Portland, Oregon. As a nation and a world community, we face trials comparable to the ones Doherty faced. She responded with courage, generosity, love, and gospel witness. Let us do the same!

#### 'Tis a gift to be simple

Happy birthday to Saint John Neumann today—nicknamed the "little bishop" not only for his stature but for the humility that came from his Redemptorist vow of poverty, which he honored even after becoming bishop of Philadelphia. Neumann's simplicity invites rich reflection for Lent. "Our great mistake is that we allow ourselves to be deceived by the spirit of worldly shrewdness, the desire for fame, and the love of comfort," he wrote to a fellow priest. "The principles of faith fade out of our hearts in proportion as we allow the principles of the world to come in." Simplify your life to make more room for what feeds your faith.

#### Redemption is at hand

Though they, along with other ancient societies, engaged in some forms of household slavery, Jews as a general rule frowned upon the institution. Slaves who were not Jewish were to be offered conversion to Judaism and if they became Jews, immediately freed. Jews were also required to redeem Jewish slaves from non-Jewish owners. Memory of their own captivity in Egypt and Babylonia loomed large, and they resented Jesus promising to free them. But when Jesus spoke of the truth setting Jews free, he was talking about another kind of enslavement, the kind we all fall

into through unskillful actions, behaviors, habits, compulsions. Look honestly at what might be restricting your inner freedom and ask Jesus to redeem you.

#### Help your unbelief

Can a believer doubt? It can be a relief to learn that a whole school of thought among Catholic theologians asserts that doubt, while seemingly corrosive, can actually bolster faith in the end. Doubt can lead to exploration, which often leads to better understanding, greater clarity, or sometimes simply a willingness to not know, to live without all questions fully answered, leaning into religious practice with an open heart. Most would call that an adult faith. What questions nag at you? Doubt, dig, and remain open to God.

#### Miles to go

Women's History Month concludes today, but the work of ensuring the rights of women continues. In a November 2022 press conference, Pope Francis acknowledged that more work needs to be done. "We have to tell the truth," the pope said. "The fight for women's rights is an ongoing fight." This includes equality in public life and also "equality of opportunities." How might we each open a door of opportunity for women in our own families, parishes, neighborhoods, schools, or offices?

#### A well-traveled pilgrim helped shape Holy Week

Holy Week begins tomorrow. It's in the description of Jesus' last week—immediately ahead of his death and Resurrection—that all four gospels resemble each other the most. The church's liturgical celebration of Holy Week, however, was a late development. Originally, Christians had only a single *Pascha* liturgy to observe Jesus' suffering, death, and Resurrection. Specific Holy Week liturgies for Palm Sunday, Holy Thursday, and Good Friday grew from individual shrines in Jerusalem where each event occurred. Thanks to a detailed travel journal, written in 383 by a remarkable woman pilgrim to the Holy Land named Egeria, these liturgies began to take shape. As Holy Week begins, let's not only honor the women at the empty tomb but the woman who helped define Holy Week.

#### **GOSPEL MEDITATION:**

March 26, 2023 5th Sunday of Lent

Of all Jesus' miracles, the most unsettling might be when he made a dead person alive. We know of three times when he did so: a girl, a young man, and Lazarus. The miracle teaches us he has the power of life and death. He anticipates his resurrection. Sin hurts us. Some sin kills us, spiritually. The three miracles reveal to us that no matter our circumstances, Jesus can give life to us.

The three miracles are instructive of the three ways we feel dead. The little dead girl symbolizes sin before it has time to mature. She's in bed and, once alive, gets right back to her life. The young man is lying in his casket in a funeral procession. This is sin allowed to fester, to grow and become somewhat normalized. Once raised, he has a short walk back home. Lazarus, a full-grown dead man, lies wrapped in burial bands in the tomb. Once he is raised, much needs to be done. He'll need to remove those bands, find new clothes, and travel all the way back home. That is sin allowed to go all the way, unchecked for months or years. It's the most spectacular of the three and reveals Jesus' glory more than the others.

What hope that should give us, for us and those whom we love! Jesus knows our sin hurts us and can even kill us spiritually. No matter the extent of the damage, he is always ready for the miracle of making the dead fully alive.
