The beginning and the end, the past and future meet and are fulfilled on this day when Jesus has risen. Jesus Christ died, but He lives!

Today the Easter message is more urgent than ever. The state of our faith, too, is so important because we are living in difficult and uncertain times. All around us there is social,

political, economic, moral, and spiritual confusion—very much like the chaos and confusion that the disciples experienced in the wake and aftermath of Jesus' arrest, crucifixion, and death. Where were they to go? To whom should they turn?

Throughout Jesus' crucifixion and after His death, the Apostles turned to Mary; they remained with Her in the upper room until the Resurrection. She was their beacon of hope and their security. It was She who kept them spiritually safe. This reminds us that even today, we must turn to Our Lady, entrust ourselves and our families to Her Immaculate Heart, and She will see to it that we pass through this time and reach spiritual maturity safe and unscathed.

In such a time of turmoil yet fulfillment the Apostles were given a great gift: the gift to "see" the Risen Lord. They did not see Him directly, however; they saw His absence through the eyes of faith. When the Apostles found themselves at the empty tomb, they saw and believed, not because Jesus was in front of them, but because He was absent. **This reminds us that the gift of faith deepens and grows stronger when we truly believe in the Lord, even when we do not see Him or feel Him present to us.** Often in the events of our life, the Lord might seem absent, but He is truly present with us, closer than we can imagine.

The generations of believers who will come after us will follow in our faith and actions, just as we have followed the faith of those before us, reaching back to the Apostles. For this reason, it is very important on this Easter morning in the year 2023 to ask ourselves: "What is the state of my faith and how can I come to believe more deeply in the coming of the Lord into my life?" I would like to suggest that you ask this important question in Our Lady's loving Presence because She is always interceding for us to make sure that each of us grows ever deeper in faith and closeness with Her Son, Jesus Christ.

On this beautiful Easter Sunday, I would like to wish all of you a very blessed, joy-filled, and hopeful day! Jesus Christ is truly risen, and we have nothing to fear!

This is the fifth installment in a series of articles about the Seven Sacraments, contributed by Deacon Peter LeTourneau, Director of Parish Ministry and Evangelization at Our Lady of the Wayside Parish.

Now that we've reviewed the three sacraments of Initiation, we will move on to the Sacraments of Healing - and first up is the **Sacrament of Penance & Reconciliation**.

We are called to live our lives in accordance with the Ten Commandments - especially the two greatest - I. Love the Lord your God with your whole heart, with your whole soul and with all your mind, and II. You shall love your neighbor as yourself. We sin when we knowingly make choices that are not in line with these commandments, resulting in harming others and breaking our relationship with God and with the Church.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church categories sinfulness into venial and mortal sins - both damage the core component of being human—the ability to love God and to love others. They are choices that we make that either wound (venial) or destroy (mortal) our ability to love.

Living our lives in a Christ-like way is not easy, and as a result we are all sinners! How wonderful it is for us that we have this beautiful sacrament always available to us that not only restores God's grace within us but strengthens it.

There are four primary actions in the celebration of the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation, all of which contribute to the healing that takes place:

- Examination of Conscience Before you even enter the sacrament, you should review your lives since our last confession, searching your thoughts, words, and actions for that which did not conform to God's commandments. This is called an examination of conscience. Tip! My favorite guide for this can be found on the Fathers of Mercy website –https://tinyurl.com/4cjzt5m9
- 2. Contrition This is the most important part of your confession you must feel remorse and regret for your sins, intend to not sin in the future and have a sincere desire to change.
- **3.** Confession Confess your mortal sins to the priest in number and kind. Confession of everyday faults (venial sins) is also recommended.
- **4. Absolution** This is when the Priest, through the authority of Jesus Christ, absolves you of your sins.
- 5. **Penance** The Priest offers a suggested act of penance. It can be a concrete action to make amends or it can be an act of charity or prayer or devotion.

For answers to these commonly asked questions about the Sacrament of Penance & Reconciliation...

- How often should I receive the Sacrament of Penance & Reconciliation
- I haven't been to reconciliation in years – do I have to recount all my sins since my last confession? Is that even possible?
- Why do I have to talk to a Priest to be forgiven? Can't I talk directly to God?

There are two "movements" in this sacrament; our movement towards God, and God's toward us. The effects of this sacrament are many! Not only forgiveness of sins, but reconciliation with God and the Church, restoration of God's grace in our soul, an increase in spiritual strength to fight temptation and finally peace in our hearts.



Anxiety is a common struggle that many of us face. Whether it's worry about the future, concerns about our health or stress over our relationships, anxiety can be a difficult burden to bear. But as people of faith, we have a powerful tool for overcoming anxiety – prayer.

The Bible tells us to "cast all your anxiety on Him because He cares for you" (1 Peter 5:7). God cares about our worries and concerns and invites us to bring them to Him in prayer. When we pray, we are not simply talking to ourselves or seeking to calm our minds. We are entering into a conversation with the God who created us, who knows us intimately, and who cares about every detail of our lives.

Prayer can take many forms, from simply expressing our worries and concerns to God, to meditating on His promises and seeking His wisdom. One powerful way to pray is to use the practice of "breath prayer," in which we repeat a short prayer or Scripture verse while breathing deeply and slowly. This can help to calm our minds and hearts, and to focus our attention on God.

Prayer is a powerful tool for



overcoming anxiety and finding lasting peace during difficult times. As we pray, we invite God to work in our lives and transform us from the inside out. We ask Him to guide us, give us strength and help us to trust in His plan for our lives.

When we pray, we are reminded of God's faithfulness and His power. We are reminded that we are not alone in our struggles, but that we have a God who is with us and for us. And as we trust in Him, we can find peace in the midst of our anxieties.

"Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God; and the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." – Philippians 4:6-7

If you are struggling with anxiety, try turning to God in prayer. Take time each day to bring your worries and concerns to Him, to seek His wisdom and to trust His plan for your life. As you do, you will discover a peace that surpasses all understanding, and you will experience the life-giving power that prayer has to transform your heart and mind and make you feel whole.

From hole to whole

Accounts vary. Sometimes Easter dawns with helpful instructionbearing angels and a palpable earthshaking. In other narratives it's almost a stealthy affair: a yawning open tomb, the shroud deserted, its meaning unclear. So too we experience the Easters of our lives in a variety of ways: fervent or undecided, joyful or indifferent or possibly even sorrowing. The empty tomb is an invitation to faith, an absence that can be filled any number of ways. We pray for each other this day, that what is empty in any of us may be filled with hope and trust.

SOLEMNITY OF THE RESURRECTION OF THE LORD (EASTER SUNDAY)

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 10:34a, 37-43; Colossians 3:1-4 or 1 Corinthians 5:6b-8; Victimae Paschali Laudes; John 20:1-9 or Matthew 28:1-10 (42, 41) or, at an afternoon or evening Mass, Luke 24:13-35 (46). *"There was a great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord descended from heaven . . . rolled back the stone, and sat upon it."*

God brings all things to completion

Who doesn't sometimes get impatient with God's plan for them? Consider that the waiting can not only be useful but also beautiful. "Trust in the slow work of God," wrote Pierre Teilhard de Chardin (who died on this day in 1955). He would know—this French Jesuit priest was forced to leave his teaching post and withdraw controversial statements in 1925 and was further condemned by the church posthumously in 1962. Decades later, leading cardinals started to see his ideas differently—favorably—and so did Popes Benedict XVI and Francis. "It is the law of all progress that it is made by passing through some stages of instability," Chardin wrote—so, like him, accept "feeling yourself in suspense and incomplete."

Wage peace

One of the most significant pillars of Catholic social teaching turns 60 today: *Pacem in terris*—in English, "Peace on Earth"—the encyclical written by Pope John XXIII to address the menace of nuclear war and the need to uphold international human rights, including racial equality and women's rights. Significantly, it stands as the first encyclical addressed to both Catholics and non-Catholics alike, drawing worldwide admiration for the church's willingness to confront the social and economic costs of the Cold War. "The social progress, order, security, and peace of each country are necessarily connected with the social progress, order, security, and peace of all other countries," he wrote. Let peace begin with you today.

Leave the battlefield behind

Most people know that the Civil War, which began on this day in 1861, was largely an unjust war fought in defense of slavery in the Southern United States (then, for a time, the Confederate States of America). What many do not know is that the first skirmish of the war, the Battle of Fort Sumter in Charleston, South Carolina, was led in part by a Catholic, Confederate Brigadier General P. G. T. Beauregard, a Creole Catholic born and raised on a plantation in Louisiana. After the failures of the Confederacy in the war, Beauregard returned to civilian life in his home region, advocating for black civil rights (including voting), societal unity, and also became an admirer of Abraham Lincoln. May we model repentance in the face of our sins and work always for the common bonds of humanity.

When the risen Christ appears to his dumbfounded disciples, he reminds them "that repentance for the forgiveness of sins would be preached in his name." Even the church itself must repent sometimes. The Catholic Native Boarding School Accountability and Healing Project is such an undertaking. Few expect rapid change, but this group of religious, church officials, and laypeople have named a "sin" the church's role in the federal efforts to dismantle Native American culture through boarding schools. That's a start. Learn more on this topic so you can be part of the healing.

The risen Christ's tender care to ensure that the disciples have a good breakfast is both achingly sweet and altogether practical. He knew that to continue his mission, the disciple would need not only the warmth of his love but the strength and focus a hearty breakfast provides. Take care of your physical and spiritual health so that, you too, may be prepared to carry on Christ's loving mission each day.

GOSPEL MEDITATION:

April 9, 2023 Easter Sunday

"When Jesus had risen, early on the first day of the week, he appeared first to Mary Magdalene, out of whom he had driven seven demons." (Mark 16:9)

Popular Catholic piety sometimes posits that the newly risen Jesus appears first to the Blessed Virgin Mary. It is a happy thought, but it's simply not what the scriptures report. We are told quite directly that he appeared first to Mary Magdalene, "out of whom he had driven seven demons."

Why would the gospel writer remind us of this unsavory detail of Mary's past? Historians tell us women were not qualified to give legal testimony. On top of that, to be possessed by not just one, but seven demons, is unsavory and terrifying. What damage had they done to her? What did she do to allow herself to be home to such evil? It doesn't seem to matter. Jesus chose Mary Magdalene to be the first one who saw him risen from the dead. He decided she was qualified.

Do you think that you are disqualified from seeing and announcing the risen Jesus because of your past demons? Maybe they are the demons of despair, confusion, self-hatred, pride, addiction, failure, boredom, laziness, or other sins. Well, don't. In the light of the Risen Jesus, all these past demons make our witness that much more believable — only if we allow ourselves to be touched by the liberating hand of Christ, just as Mary Magdalene did.
