"Lose the Bunny!"

Going into stores and restaurants during the past 40+ days, I saw Easter seasonal decorations of bunnies, chicks, colored eggs, lilies, and – Oh, did I say -bunnies.

People wanted to brighten their facility with seasonal signs of the times. I ask – "What seasonal sign was missing?" The crucifix – the symbol of the risen Christ -THE symbol of Easter.

The Easter Bunny and the other mentioned items are commercial symbols, meant to get people in a good mood to buy various items. But the crucifix is the symbol of the rewards of heaven that we receive through the Passion, Death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Last Sunday we celebrated Easter 2023, the conclusion of *Holy Week*. Last Thursday night was the start of the *Sacred Triduum* of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Saturday night we celebrated the Easter Vigil.

The Triduum can be summed up in one word – *love*.

We see Jesus' love for all of us as He suffers the Passion and Death. As He is dying on the cross He says, "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do."

Jesus is in the tomb for 40 hours, then is resurrected on Easter. Jesus endures all of this for love of the Father and love of us. He expects us to share our love of God through our sufferings and our love for others.

We all have sufferings in our lives. Jesus accepted the sufferings in His life for love of the Father. He asks us to accept the sufferings in our lives. We imitate Jesus by carrying our cross.

With the coming of Easter we may say – "Lent's over! – now we can return to our "normal" life." That's almost like saying that we were underwater but now we've come up to the surface – we can get a breath of fresh air.


Lent was not just about "giving up" something for 40 days, it's about taking some time to evaluate where our faith journey is taking us. This is a time to make changes in our life and to ask ourselves – "how has this lent brought me closer to God?"

When Jesus appeared to the apostles, He guided them as to what they needed to do. Later, the apostles, filled with the Holy Spirit, did not stay in that room. They brought Jesus' message to their community and eventually, to the whole world. We also are called to carry God's message forward.

Last Sunday was Easter Sunday, this Sunday is Divine Mercy Sunday where we celebrate the glorified Jesus offering His peace and mercy to all who ask.

We don't want to be a "Doubting Thomas", laying down our expectations of what we want before we will believe.


Let the Easter Bunny go hopping down the road; we need to focus on the saving power Jesus gives us through His Cross.

JESUS' DIVINE MERCY

Sunday of Divine Mercy - Year A

In 1936, something extraordinary occurred in Poland; Jesus spoke the following words to a simple Polish nun named Sr. Faustina Kowalska: "My daughter, tell the whole world about My inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day the very depths of My tender mercy are open. [...] **The soul that**

will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. [...] Let no soul fear to draw near to Me, even though its sins be as scarlet. My mercy is so great that no mind, be it of man or of angel, will be able to fathom it throughout all eternity. Everything that exists has come forth from the very depths of My most tender mercy. Every soul in its relation to Me will contemplate My love and mercy throughout eternity. The Feast of Mercy emerged from My very depths of tenderness. [...] Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the Fount of My Mercy" (Diary 699).

Thanks to St. Pope John Paul II, who canonized Sr. Faustina Kowalska and instituted the Feast of Divine Mercy, the entire Church celebrates this feast today. We need this feast more than ever, since we are living in a post-Christian era of great fear and worldwide unrest. Even within the Church, there is division and moral confusion. We desperately long for the peace that comes from turning to the Fount of Jesus' Mercy.

As your pastor and spiritual father, it is my greatest desire that each and every member of this parish have peace of soul and go to Heaven. And what greater way to achieve this than by taking advantage of Jesus' spiritual offer of Divine Mercy for so little a cost—reception of the Eucharist (in a state of grace) and Confession (within one week of today). If you would like to receive this gift and have not been to the Sacrament of Confession in the past week, we will be hearing confessions in the parish church today (Sunday) from 2:00-3:00 PM. If you cannot come or are homebound, please call the parish office to make an appointment, and Fr. Gilbert or I will be happy to meet with you either at the parish or in your home during the week. The Sacrament of Confession will also be available on Tuesday evening from 6:00-7:00 PM in the church. And, if none of these times work for you, then you can check when the surrounding parishes offer confession.

In another place in her diary, St. Faustina writes that Jesus said: "I am love and Mercy Itself. There is no misery that could be a match for My mercy, neither will misery exhaust it, because as it is being granted – it increases. The soul that trusts in My mercy is most fortunate, because I Myself take care of it" (Diary 1273). Let us trust in Jesus' mercy, and then all will truly be well.

FROM THE HEART OF A SURVIVOR

In November of 2003, I became pregnant. Although it was unplanned, my baby definitely was not unwanted. I was very worried about telling my boyfriend the news and what his reaction would be. It was one of anger. How would we afford and take care of a baby? Eventually, he came around and said he would stand by me, but then he called telling me the baby was not his. This upset me so much, my sister told me it was better to take care of the "problem" now, rather than to give it up when it was born. She urged me to get an abortion and then never speak about it again. I did not want the abortion, but in my mind I did not know how I could ever do this alone, so I gave in to the pressure. I felt very scared and abandoned.

I called and made an appointment for a Saturday morning. I tried to talk to the father of the baby the night before to tell him what was about to happen but my sister made the call instead of me and told me a woman answered and said he was not home. They did not allow me to speak to him. I felt like the lamb being led to the slaughter. When we went to the abortion clinic, it was very scary, with a lot of women and men sitting around in silence. My sister filled out all the forms and gave all the wrong information because she was worried our neighbors would find out, so, she told all lies in spite of the fact I had a heart problem at the time. The nurse gave me a sonogram and checked my blood pressure. I asked why they were doing all this, when my unborn baby is about to be killed. It did not make sense to me. She asked if this was what I wanted. I wanted to say no, but before I could reply my sister said that I did not have any choice.

I cried and cried, and I knew this was very wrong. I saw a lot of girls on stretchers, looking very sad. I wanted to turn around, but all I did was look at the ceiling and the clock as the doctor proceeded to kill my unborn baby. When I came out they asked if I wanted to have other children. Something about a medicine they would have to give me. I just laid there crying and alone. I knew what had just happened was evil.

I drank to ease the pain, and I was very angry and emotional when I would see pregnant women. I would even cry when I saw babies on the TV. I would look out the window for my lost baby wondering if the pain would ever go away...

I knew I needed help, and eventually, through church, got the number for "Entering Canaan". It has helped me with my healing through the retreats and groups on post abortion healing. It has been a long hard road but, thanks to God, I am moving forward, forgiving, learning how my abortion impacted me, and trying to help other women.



The second Sacrament of Healing is Anointing of the Sick. An often-asked question is if this is the same as Last Rites. While Anointing of the Sick can take place prior to death, it could also be considered Last Rites if the person is actively dying – however this is a term we don't really use anymore.

Anointing of the Sick is a sacrament that is given for healing of the body (if it's God's will) and spirit of someone who is very ill. This person may not be dying but may be at serious risk of dying. There are three distinct and integral aspects to the celebration of this sacrament.

- 1. The Prayer of Faith This is the community asking for God's help for the sick. The community is defined as the entire church and represented by the priest, family, friends, and any others gathered during the anointing.
- 2. Laying on of Hands With this action, the priest indicates that this person is the object of the church's prayer of faith. It is a sign of blessing praying for the power of God's healing grace, and it is also an invocation praying for the coming of the Holy Spirit.
- 3. Anointing with the Oil of the Sick Use of this oil is meant to be a comfort to the sick and, through the presence, power and grace of the Holy Spirit provides strength to fight the physical and spiritual effects of illness.

This sacrament can be repeated when the sick person recovers, and then becomes sick again or when during the same illness, their condition becomes

of Christ for the last time. This is often referred to as "food for the journey home."

more serious. A sick person who recovers after being anointed should be encouraged to give thanks for the favors received. It's important to note that this sacrament is no longer seen as the primary rite associated with dying, but a dying person should be anointed if he or she has not been anointed earlier.

Pastoral Care of the Dying is the set of prayers and sacramental activities that take place when it's clear that the person is dying and preparing for their next life. The emphasis here is trust in the Lord's promise of eternal life rather than on the struggle against illness. The core of this sacrament is receiving Eucharist Viaticum – which is receiving the Body

The Celebration of Viaticum is the completion and crown of our Christian life on this earth. The Catechism of the Catholic Church states, "The Eucharist should always be the last sacrament of the earthly journey, the 'viaticum' for 'passing over' to eternal life" (No. 1517). It also says: "Communion in the body and blood of Christ, received at this moment of 'passing over' to the Father, has a particular significance and importance. It is the seed of eternal life and the power of resurrection, according to the words of the Lord: 'He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him up at the last day' [Jn 6:54].

Viaticum is complemented by the Commendation of the Dying – some of the most beautiful and powerful prayers in the Church's repertoire. These should be said at the time of death or when death is clearly imminent. Then there are the Prayers for the Dead, which are intended for use after the person has died. These are meant to send the dead person on his or her way and to comfort those who are present.

There is a cultural difficulty with this sacrament. When a loved one makes the transition from being ill to actively dying - too often we are reluctant to face this fact or perhaps are not told honestly about the state of our loved one. As a result, pastoral care of the one dying comes too late to provide a compassionate and peaceful accompaniment to the dying and those who love them. While difficult, we must not deprive our loved ones of the full healing of mind and soul that will help ease their transition to eternal life. If you are ever in doubt about whether you or a loved one should receive this sacrament, please contact the parish.

Put disappointments behind

Learn a lesson from the experience of the apostle we've come to know as "doubting Thomas." Insisting that our expectations be met is often the path to disillusionment and heartbreak. The way to peace is another route entirely. As Saint John Chrysostom taught, "So you want peace of heart? Then do not seek health, nor wealth, nor fame, nor power, nor luxury. Seek wisdom in God's sight, stick to the virtues, and nothing will be able to make you sad." Start by cultivating the seven big virtues: faith, hope, love, prudence, temperance, courage, and justice. And leave disappointment in the rearview mirror.

Catholics can, however, renew baptismal vows—and often do at Mass, especially during the Easter season, including the Easter Vigil Mass. She told me her father had been unfaithful to her mother. She said of her fiancé, "I want him to prove to me that he won't cheat on me." The young man looked at me helplessly, raised his eyebrows and shrugged his shoulders. What evidence could he possibly give to validate such a proof? Nothing. All he could do was invite her to trust him.


We all are wounded by experiences of imperfect love. We also are tempted to demand from God proof of His fidelity and goodness. We are like St. Thomas the Apostle who, on that second Sunday of Easter, demands proof of the Lord's resurrection. "Unless I see the mark of the nail... I will not believe." Our science, technology and mathematics can indeed prove a great deal. But there are some things that require trusting another person. We prove promises of love only by trusting.

St. Thomas indeed saw the wounds of Jesus and believed. But there is an even greater blessing for us who simply trust Him — and all the truths the Church proclaims — because of the trustworthiness of the Risen One who speaks. This week let's trust Jesus without seeing him.


