YOUR BODY IS A TEMPLE.

Today our culture seems to prioritize self-gratification. We see it in instant online shopping, social media's endless scrolling and most unfortunately one-night stands or contraception. The latter has major consequences with unplanned pregnancies seen as inconvenient and consequently aborted. It's easy to forget that our bodies and the body of every other person are temples that God created in His likeness and for Him to reside in. St. John Paul II explores what this means in our relationships and how to view ourselves as God does through his work, the Theology of the Body. Here are 5 key features:

- 1. It's about the other person. In an age when many individuals approach their relationships as ways of seeking their own pleasure, interests, or gain, St. John Paul II reminds us that such self-assertion is a dead end that will never lead to the love and happiness we long for. We are made for giving love, not getting love, and are most fulfilled when giving ourselves to others.
- 2. **We are not meant to be alone**. Here, St. John Paul II reflects on Genesis 2:18: "It is not good for man to be alone." Adam comes to realize that he is different from animals and more than a body that he has a spiritual dimension. There is nothing else in creation like him. John Paul II explains that man only finds fulfillment when he lives in a relationship of mutual self-giving, living not for himself, but for another person.
- 3. Sexual intimacy in marriage is a complete giving of one's body and soul. Next, John Paul II reflects on how oneness in flesh does not refer merely to a bodily union, but points to a deeper spiritual union. Since the body reveals the soul, when man and woman give their bodies to each other in marital intercourse, they give themselves to each other. This is opposite to secular culture's view of sexual intimacy where the main purpose is with our own pleasure in mind and without any regard for the body's capacity to express self-giving love.

- 4. In relationships of mutual respect, you are beloved. Before the fall, sin had not yet entered into the world and we were free from all selfish desires. We sought the good of the other and not as an object to be used. In this kind of environment of complete mutual love and responsibility, personal intimacy can flourish. In such a relationship with total trust one feels free to give himself as he really is, knowing that he will be welcomed.
- 5. In sinful relationships, we are viewed as objects. After the fall, man stopped seeing his beloved as a person entrusted to him and a gift he longs to serve selflessly. John Paul II says Adam "felt that he had just stopped...being above the world of" the animals, which are driven by instinct and desires (p. 116). Now his heart's love for Eve is tainted by selfish desires to use her and view her primarily in terms of sexual value.

While we are unable to go back to the ideal relationship that existed in the Garden of Eden, we can accept Christ's redemptive work in our lives and experience healing of our disordered passions. With His help, we can make an effort to see our relationships the way God does. We have to choose Him, and once we do that, there would naturally be a profound respect for life.

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

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

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

Playground Safety: Enjoying Outdoor Activity While Avoiding Injury

Warm weather has families flocking to playgrounds to help kids burn energy, and local pediatricians are rejoicing at the sight of increased physical activity and outdoor playtime to benefit mental health. But, as excited as we all are for more outdoor activity, experts say it's important for parents to be



vigilant and help mitigate injuries for kids moving fast at crowded playgrounds this spring and summer.

According to Dr. Kristina Walick, pediatric orthopedic surgery specialist at Advocate Children's Hospital, there has been a noticeable uptick in playground injuries this year due to falls on climbing equipment specifically causing fractures of wrists, elbows and ankles.

"Fractures account for about 35% of all playground injuries presenting to the emergency departments – with about 50% of the extremity fractures requiring hospitalization occurring on monkey bars or climbing gyms," Dr. Walick said. "Injuries such as cuts, scrapes and contusions can also occur – and even when using equipment like swings or slides."

Children should always be supervised while at the playground to help avoid injury, Dr. Walick said. **Here are several tips to keep your children as safe as possible:**

- Look for playgrounds with a surface base of shredded rubber, wood chips or sand. These surfaces are safer than those with asphalt or cement because they provide a softer landing.
- Keep an eye out for damaged equipment, which may have sharp edges.
- Avoid the playground if it is wet. Wet equipment can be slippery, and children can fall easily.
- Take into consideration your child's age and size; make sure the playground is an appropriate size for your child
- Children should always wear shoes to the playground and not go barefoot. Going barefoot puts your child at risk of getting splinters or glass in their feet. Also, keep shoelaces tied because loose shoestrings can get caught and cause a fall.
- Make sure your child goes down the slide one at a time. If a young child is on an adult lap going down the slide, their leg can get caught under the adult, causing a twisting injury to the leg and possibly a fracture.
- Only one person should be on a swing at a time. Also, watch when walking in front of a moving swing. If the child is too close, they can be hit.

"Playgrounds provide a great place for children to get out and have fun, so we want to encourage outdoor playtime on these structures," Dr. Walick said. "But, after play, take note if your child complains of pain in a specific area. If there is a noted deformity, this is likely a fracture and you should seek care right away. If there is swelling, this could also be a fracture. Pain or limping that does not resolve in one or two days is concerning and may indicate an injury that should be treated."

If you think your child may have an injury, Dr. Walick said parents should contact their pediatrician or provider right away.

Instituting a better bedside manner

Hospitals in Rome and throughout Europe were abysmal in the 1500s, when Camillus de Lellis was admitted—twice—with an infected leg. Hospital workers were poor, often beggars and prisoners, who showed up mostly for free meals. Some even stole food from patients! Saint Camillus was so disgusted by this treatment that he got up from his bed to provide comfort—and cleanliness—to other patients. Thus his vocation was born, along with the Servants of the Sick, the religious institute Camillus founded after becoming a priest. A great Catholic tradition was likewise born: not just spiritual solace but clean and professional care as well. Visit the Catholic Health Association website to pray for hospital workers.

Wednesday, Jul 19, 2023

Mercy me

Our tradition contains a variety of words to describe "missing the mark" when it comes to personal conduct: sin, transgression, and iniquity, a word used hundreds of times in scripture. Iniquity describes willful harming, where we choose to hurt or act with malice. It gets at the character or quality of our intentions. In a sense, our actions are all we really ever own. We carry them with us and we fall short at times. Thankfully, God's mercy is greater even than our iniquity. Examine your conscience, make amends

where possible, and call upon the Lord's mercy. Ask God to crown you with kindness and compassion, as today's psalm promises.

TODAY'S READINGS: Exodus 3:1-6, 9-12; Matthew 11:25-27 (391). "The Lord is kind and merciful. He pardons all your iniquities, he heals all your ills. He redeems your life from destruction, he crowns you with kindness and compassion."

Thursday, Jul 20, 2023

Inspiration for a dangerous mission

Today's saint, Apollinaris, was a bishop during the first century of the church, a dangerous time to be a Christian. Roman authorities and others disliked the followers of Jesus for disrupting social norms and threatening a social order that gave Roman emperors God-like authority. Christianity was also a new movement, making it even more untrustworthy. Apollinaris was bishop of Ravenna, Italy, and for that public role he was savagely beaten, later dying of his wounds. His martyrdom inspired early disciples. Who inspires you to live dangerously in faith?

MEMORIAL OF APOLLINARIS, BISHOP, MARTYR TODAY'S READINGS: Exodus 3:13-20; Matthew 11:28-30 (392). "Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart."

A beautiful work in progress

God is the creator par excellence and invites all of creation, especially human beings, to share in the gift of creating. God enables us "to be intelligent and free causes in order to complete the work of creation, to perfect its harmony" (Catechism §307). There is a beauty in the incompleteness or "unfinishedness" of creation. Not only does it give us the opportunity to follow God's lead, but, according to distinguished professor and theologian Sister Anne Patrick, S.N.J.M., it reveals a beauty of its own and stirs us to gratitude for creation's patient unfolding. What gifts do you find in your own acts of creating?

Saturday, Jul 22, 2023

Who do you say she is?

No biblical figure is surrounded by more mystery than Mary Magdalene. Who was she, really? What we know from the texts, says Catholic writer James Carroll, is that she was a leader in the community of Jesus' followers. While the men abandoned Jesus in his hour of need, Mary was one of the women who stayed with him even through the Crucifixion. She was the first person to whom Jesus appeared after his Resurrection and the first to preach that Good News, and her status as an apostle in the early church rivaled even that of Peter. Over time, her status was questioned, her reputation tarnished. Powerful women have contended with such treatment throughout the ages. Mary Magdalene stands as a symbol for gender equity and justice as well as faithful witness.

FEAST OF MARY MAGDALENE, APOSTLE TO THE APOSTLES TODAY'S READINGS: Song of Songs 3:1-4b or 2 Corinthians 5:14-17; John 20:1-2, 11-18 (603). "On the first day of the week, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb early in the morning, while it was still dark, and saw the stone removed from the tomb."

GOSPEL MEDITATION:

July 16, 2023

15th Sunday in Ordinary Time

It's not uncommon to hear people complain that we Catholics often fail in communicating our faith. Fair enough. We can and should improve there. But it's interesting to notice that Jesus himself was implicitly accused by his disciples of a similar failure. This week in Matthew's gospel they are perplexed that he speaks to the crowds in ambiguous parables. The Lord's riddles leave many people more confused than before. He responds by pointing out that his parables have an intentional dual purpose: to hide (for some) and to reveal (for others) his Gospel: "Because knowledge of the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven has been granted to you, but to them it has not been granted" (Matthew 13:11). Is Jesus being unnecessarily difficult, obscurantist, or, worse, elitist?

No. We have to remember that all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge lie hidden in him (c.f., Col. 2:3). He is the word of God from heaven to be planted in the earth of our humanity to bear great fruit. However, like a lover delicately pursuing his beloved, we're dealing with a relationship, not new data. When we aren't willing to personally accept Jesus into our lives, the "info" of the Gospel will simply not make sense to us. It'll seem bizarre, esoteric, or like incoherent religious-speak. But when we are willing to accept Jesus into our lives, everything else starts to make sense. When others don't understand the Church or the Lord, let's be patient. Love is patient. Sometimes it has to hide before it is revealed.
