Throughout the history of the Israelites, God spoke to the people in various, powerful, and effective ways. He punished justly, but He also showed much goodness and mercy. I think that for the Israelites and for us also, it is most difficult to understand the reason why God treats both the good and the bad with the same patience.

Sometimes we might even ask ourselves,

"Why is God indifferent to sinners, to people who commit evil, and to human weaknesses? What does His indifference mean?"

The devout Israelites and even we devout Christians and Catholics have a tendency to divide people into two groups: good people and bad people. One day we might be surprised to find out who is actually in Heaven. The kingdom of God is made of up of people who are weak and sinful, but who choose God over and over during their lives on the earth.

We have the freedom to either choose what is good or what is bad. Like a small child who learns right and wrong from his parents, we too must learn what is truly good from Scripture, Tradition, and the Magisterium of our Mother the Church. However, like every parent, the Church will not force us to choose what is good. Our Heavenly Father also will not force us. He simply waits for our choice.

We know that God is patient and that He gives us time to turn back to Him. What we do not know, however, is how much time we have left. Like St. Paul, I would also like to encourage you, once again, to invite the Holy Spirit to help you to truly pray for the gift of faith so that you will have eyes to see and the will to choose to do and to follow what is Good, True, and Beautiful—namely, God.



How Team Sports Can Benefit Mental Health

It is no secret exercise is good for our physical and mental health. For many children and adolescents, participating in sports can be a great way to get moving while having fun. Between stress relief and sharpening teamwork and collaboration skills, there are countless benefits to team sports.

"Playing sports can be incredibly beneficial for teens' mental health," says Cody Pangrazzi, a licensed clinical social worker at Aurora Behavioral Health Center in Green Bay, Wis. "Getting outdoors is always great for our well-being and being physically active typically leads to improved sleep quality, which is critical in maintaining our mental health."

He points to several other mental benefits of participating in team sports:

- Children and teens learn many important life skills and values from playing a team sport, including confidence, communication, resilience, responsibility, time management and teamwork.
- Being active releases natural chemicals in the brain that affect emotional regulation and mood, including endorphins, which help lower the levels of the stress hormone cortisol. Exercise also raises the body's levels of serotonin and norepinephrine, which help improve mood.
- Some research has even suggested playing sports may trigger a state of relaxation, which can promote problem-solving skills, enhanced memory and creativity, and greater focus. Organized sports, athletics and exercise can be tiring for the body, which helps to clear our minds and focus on what we are doing at that moment. It promotes mindfulness and the ability to be present in the here and now. This helps to decrease anxiety, depression and ruminating thoughts of stressors in the past or future.



- Participating in team sports typically means many practices, games and time commitments. These responsibilities often keep teens away from joining in on reckless behavior, including drug use, or spending hours on social media.
- Sports reinforce a growth mindset to achieve things over a period. This helps to decrease expectations of instant gratification. Learning how to manage delayed gratification keeps children and teens persistent with their goals and helps with building frustration tolerance. Children and teens become more reflective and self-aware when approaching situations in life this way.
- Being on a team is a great way to meet people and make friends.

"The valuable skills enhanced coupled with the physical and mental benefits of exercise make playing team sports a great option for so many teens," says Pangrazzi.

Pangrazzi also says there is overwhelming research on involvement in sports enhancing chances of adolescents staying active as adults, allowing them to de-stress in healthy ways and stay connected socially through sports and athletics.

"It is also important to listen to our adolescents when they express their desires. Some children may not be interested in participating in a team sport. Work with them to uncover their interests and find extracurricular activities they would enjoy," says Pangrazzi. "The important thing is we are listening to our children and helping them discover ways to learn about themselves and the world around them while feeling happy and healthy."

God's kind of justice

Our exercise of justice can be remarkably heartless. Too often we confuse justice with judgment, imagining justice is only served by lowering the boom on the offending party. The writer of the book of Wisdom describes God's justice as both mighty and clement: that is, powerful and merciful at the same time. Among the loveliest recommendations in the Old Testament is this: "Those who are just must be kind." Written 50 years before the time of Jesus, Wisdom demonstrates why Jesus came to heal, forgive, and rescue—not destroy, condemn, and disown. Make kindness your partner in justice.

Unburden vourself

With so many things to do, places to go, and people to see, how could the average busy person these days possibly relate to contemplative hermits? Maybe the holy example of hermits, like Sharbel Makhlūf, is exactly what our hectic times need to help us detach from all that consumes us. This 19th-century Lebanese saint was a shepherd-turned-priest who later became a monk and then a hermit. After his death, miracles were attributed to his intercession. At his beatification in 1965, Pope Paul VI said: "May he make us understand, in a world largely fascinated by wealth and comfort, the paramount value of poverty, penance and asceticism, to liberate the soul in its ascent to God."

Walk this way

Annually an estimated 350,000 pilgrims walk the Camino de Santiago—the Way of Saint James. The Camino has a series of medieval routes, but the French Way is most popular. On foot it takes 30 days, crossing foothills of the Pyrenees and many fields, towns, and villages before traversing Galicia. Each route leads to the city of Santiago de Compostela with its magnificent cathedral, believed to be the final resting place of Saint James the Greater, who brought Christianity to Spain. Pope Callixtus II declared in 1122: "The city of Compostela, through the support of Blessed James, has been made sacred for the faithful and a help for those coming to it." Though we only know of Joachim and Anne from early Christian writings, not biblical texts, it is logical to give a place of prominence to those who, after all, were Jesus' grandparents. It is said they struggled greatly to give birth until God, seeing their holiness, granted them the supreme privilege of parenting Mary, the mother

of God. In the Orthodox Church of America, they carry a title of great respect: Holy Ancestors of God. Think of the sacrifices your own grandparents likely made in raising your parents. Let your life honor them.

Help build a church with a conscience

Many Catholics take for granted the existence of a robust Catholic social service network. But back in the early 20th century, that was not the case. Poverty was common and social work was emerging as a profession. The social-concerns encyclical *Rerum Novarum* (1891) and Father William J. Kerby, co-founder of what became Catholic Charities USA, were two important influences that helped develop social consciousness among U.S. Catholics. Thanks to Kerby, who died on this date in 1936, and other activists and thinkers, the American church now includes many anti-poverty efforts. What can you do to further this critical social legacy?

Blessed are those who hear the word

Blessed Charlie Stanley Rother is on the path to sainthood, a surprise for many who knew him as a rather shy and grumpy lad. Stanley grew up in Oklahoma. He was skilled at farming and could fix practically anything. He also felt called to the priesthood. After ordination, another calling came, this time, to go to Guatemala. There, Stanley used his gifts as he lived and worked among the people. With them, he too faced the terror of the raging Guatemalan civil war. He was martyred on July 28, 1981. Befriend Blessed Stanley and ask him to accompany you as you listen for God's calling.

Even the savior of the world needs friends

Martha, Mary, and Lazarus held a privileged place in Jesus' heart. As a wandering preacher who had "no place to lay his head," Jesus knew he always had a place to call home in visiting his three dear friends. Each gifted him in a special way, as the 2021 decree combining their veneration from the Congregation for Divine Worship and Sacraments points out: "Martha generously offered him hospitality, Mary listened attentively to his words, and Lazarus promptly emerged from the tomb at the command of the one who humiliated death." Cherish and nurture your dearest friendships; they are a treasure through thick and thin.

GOSPEL MEDITATION:

July 23, 2023

16th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Patience is rooted in Hope (an image of a bush filled with birds would be great)

Life, like the church, is often burdened with evil, smallness, and impurities. The Lord's parables give us a hope-filled perspective on all three.

Evil: in Jesus' parable about the good farmer whose enemy plants weeds at night, Jesus tells us that God is not the cause of evil but permits evil to exist with good out of his patient love. He *will* finally deal with it, but his love lets things stay messy for a time.

Smallness: It's funny that Jesus says his kingdom looks like... wait for it... a bush. What a letdown! Yet this little shrub still somehow has room for all the birds of the sky. The smallness of the Church, and even our own little lives, still provides plenty of room for all whom God sends.

Impurities: divisions and hypocrisies in the Church and our own hearts exasperate us. Recall that Jesus compares his kingdom to a lump of dough with impure leaven eating away at it and therefore making it expand. It's the secret of the Cross. Not how we'd prefer it. But finally, great news.

The field, the bush, the loaf: all three parables invite us to embrace a patience rooted in hope: one day the field will be weeded, the bush filled with birds, and the risen loaf leaven-free.
