CHASTITY: FREEDOM, PEACE, & ROMANCE WITHOUT REGRET.

In today's world, it seems backwards that a couple would abstain from sex before marriage. Watch any TV show or movie and the couples are always sleeping together while dating. What a strange thought that we need to "try each other out" sexually in order to know if we are compatible. How can chastity be a solution and help us promote the sanctity of life?

- 1. What is chastity? Chastity is sexual self-control. It means placing sexual intimacy within one relationship and one relationship only: marriage. For centuries chastity has been an admired moral virtue. It brings good news because those who practice it do not have to spend valuable time worrying about pregnancy or other diseases.
- 2. Why bother saving yourself for your spouse? There is no greater gift a man and a woman can give each other on their wedding night than the gift of their virginity. And it's a gift you can give only once. It provides those who practice it freedom from guilt, being used by others, pregnancy, the trauma of abortion and freedom to develop self-control and self-respect.
- 3. What if you already 'unwrapped the box' so to speak? Remember, chastity is a spiritual, not a physical, state. Chastity is about sexual self-control, an attitude of respect and gratitude for the gift that sex is. A person who can no longer regain his or her physical virginity can, at any time, regain chastity.

- 4. How can I be chaste? Chastity is a part of yourself that is communicated through your daily words and actions. There are three kinds of language: verbal, body and clothes. Understand how to have modesty in your dress, speech and action. It is possible to say no to sex in all three ways. If you are pressured to go farther than you wish, it shows how your partner loves him/ herself more than you.
- 5. Anything is possible with God. Last month we reviewed how our bodies are created by and for God. It might seem impossible to practice this virtuebut with prayer and God helping you understand your limits, anything is possible! You can choose chastity for your future path.

Chastity is not something that just our grandparents practiced. It's a practical solution to the issues and problems facing our secular culture today. It's a beautiful contract between yourself and the person you are involved with, and invites God to participate in and guide your relationship. 



CONTEMPLATE ETERNAL LIFE

20th Sunday in Ordinary Time



Father Arthur Marat

In today's Gospel, we heard the account of two different miracles; first, the miracle of the healing of the daughter who was possessed by a demon, and second, the miracle of the faith of the mother of this girl. I would like to speak mainly about the second miracle, where Jesus saves the Canaanite woman's daughter from posses-

sion by the devil and the grips of death. Death comes to each person, whether great or unimportant, known or unknown. We will one day pass from this world into the next.

I do not think that Jesus needed to perform this miracle in order to solve the problem of death. Rather, I believe that he performed this miracle of raising the little girl from being possessed by devil so that we might believe in Him and have faith.

While the media tells us much about the deaths of people, and focuses on the details surrounding their deaths, perhaps now is a good time to think more deeply about this mystery. Perhaps now is a good time to remember that death is not the end of life. Instead, it is only a phase—a passage from this life into the next. And perhaps now is also a very good time to ask ourselves: "What do I think about death? What is my attitude toward death? Do I, as a Catholic, believe that Jesus died and resurrected so that I might have eternal life?"

If we truly have faith, invite Jesus into our lives, and live according to His teachings, then there we might meet with Him in Heaven. Do you have faith, my brothers and sisters? Do you truly believe?

I would like to invite you to take some time during this weekend to spend time in silence and to contemplate the gift of eternal life.

Eternal life is truly the greatest miracle—the greatest gift from God.

And God makes it possible for us to receive this gift through Jesus Christ. Each day, God invites us to participate in eternal life, but do we follow Him? Do we respond to the call?

Is Your Child Scared of Storms? Read This.

Severe weather can cause anxiety and fear in people of all ages. Dr. Emma Olivera, a pediatrician at Advocate Children's Hospital, explains where those feelings may stem from in children.

"Depending on their age, a child's fear or anxiety around storms may come from loud noises. As they grow, it can be related to things they have experienced. Maybe they've seen their neighborhood or home affected by fierce winds and downpours. When they are exposed to media, they may be worried about storms because of the grand-scale destruction they've seen in movies or on the news."

Dr. Olivera offers the following tips for parents to help their children feel safe and calm through storms:

Before a storm:

- Discuss what things about storms your child likes and dislikes and avoid minimizing their fears. Active listening is important.
- Make a safety plan. Discussing ways to stay safe whether you are at home or away from home when a storm occurs can provide comfort.
- Role play with your child by replicating a thunderstorm, using noises from a phone app or materials at home, and acting out your safety plan.
- If you haven't created a safety kit for your home, do so. An internet search can help you make sure you have the right items, including flashlights, first aid supplies, water bottles, extra batteries and more. Remind your child where the safety kit is kept.



During a storm:

- Explain what is happening during the storm. If your child understands what is going on around them, they may have decreased anxiety.
- Stay calm and reassure your child. Modeling a positive and calm attitude will help your child feel comforted.
- Talk through your family's safety plan and reassure your child that you are there for them.
- Find ways to distract your child using games, reading books or eating snacks.

After the storm:

- Reassure your child the storm is over or lightening up based on weather information. If it is safe to do so, resume usual activities.
- Limit your child's exposure to media coverage of the storm, as what is shared on the news is typically focused on the storm's destruction.

"Feeling prepared, whether you are a child or an adult, can go a long way when it comes to managing feelings of anxiety or fear," says Dr. Olivera.

Look beyond the wardrobe

The saying "Clothes make the man" was certainly not true for Pope Pius X. He was born poor, teased at school for his tattered clothes, and sometimes carried his shoes to make them last longer. When he became pope in 1903, remaining as humble as his origins, he said the only thing that had changed about him was the color of his cassock from black to white—a fact he sometimes forgot since he had to be reminded not to wipe his pen on his clothes anymore. Let Pius X remind you to stay true to your authentic self by keeping your life simple.

Eight days a week

The Queenship of Mary doubles as a liturgical bookend, concluding eight full days since celebrating her Assumption. In liturgical language, these eight days form an octave. Most simply, an octave extends the celebration of a church feast from a single day into eight. Historically, Christianity inherited the practice from Judaism, which, for instance, celebrates eight days of Hanukkah and circumcision eight days after a boy's birth—the latter being why many baptismal fonts are octagonal. If a week is seven days, then the eighth day begins a new week—the eighth day signaling the start of something new or renewal, just as Baptism makes a person new or "born again." Honor Mary anew by praying the Salve Regina today.

Go deep

Today is the feast of Rose of Lima, patron of Latin America. You can visit her tomb in the historic center of Lima, Peru, a place teeming with activity. Enter the Dominican monastery where she is buried and leave behind the noise and heat of the street. Descend

a narrow passage; bow your head to clear the low ceiling. You'll emerge into a cool, hushed room with her tomb at the far end. It is a holy place—a place you'd never know if you didn't go deep. How do you get to the deep sacred space within your daily life?

Pure faith

Tradition has it that Bartholomew was tortured to death for the faith. Scholars believe that he is mentioned in scripture by both his name and by the name Nathaniel. Nathaniel was famously complimented by Jesus for being a true Israelite, with no duplicity. Purity of heart, in fact, is how most holy disciples attain holiness. Through profound connection to God, they avoid guile, duplicity, and other sins that are so easy to fall into when God slides into the background. Saint Bartholomew, help us maintain a clean heart.

Women will not remain silent!

Do you know all 333 women of the Bible? There are at least that many, writes Catholic commentator Alice Camille, and each is worth getting to know. Visible presence of women in leadership roles has long suffered from hierarchical structures rooted in patriarchal values. The establishment of the biblical canon reflects this as well with women's voices and stories rarely included except in support roles. Stories such as that of Ruth and Naomi that survived the canonical cutting-room floor are a beacon of light and remind us that despite overwhelming suppression of women's voices, they could not be silenced. How are you called to give voice or to amplify suppressed voices today?

TODAY'S READINGS: Ruth 1:1, 3-6, 14b-16, 22; Matthew 22:34-40 (423). "Ruth said, 'Do not ask me to abandon or forsake you!"

A ruling from the bench

Jesus speaks of the scribes and Pharisees sitting on the "chair of Moses." Archeologists have uncovered stone chairs in prominent places in ancient synagogues where such leaders presumably sat as they pronounced on all things related to Jewish Law and Tradition. When it came to fulfilling the spirit of the Law rather than just the letter, Jesus called out the hypocrisy of those who did not practice what they preach. In any field—politics, business, religion—leaders need to be judged not by the eloquence of their words but by the integrity of their actions. That goes for all of us, wherever we take our seat!

TODAY'S READINGS: Ruth 2:1-3, 8-11; 4:13-17; Matthew 23:1-12 (424). "The scribes and the Pharisees have taken their seat on the chair of Moses.... but do not follow their example. For they preach but they do not practice."

GOSPEL MEDITATION:

August 20, 2023

20th Sunday in Ordinary Time

The suffering of a child symbolizes uniquely terrible evil as well as despair about the future. This week's Gospel gives a "limit" case in which Jesus encounters this evil in the form of a mother with a suffering daughter. What he does is stunning and massively helpful for us if we bravely ponder the details.

The Canaanite woman comes to Jesus and begs his mercy. "My daughter is tormented by a demon," she declares to him. Shockingly, he responds first with silence, then with a dismissive comment, and only then finally accedes to her third request. Is this simply a lesson in perseverance in our petitions to God, who is like a genie in a bottle? Does that justify the humiliation and pain this woman suffers? Is the Lord cruel?

I don't think so. Notice how the encounter ends. She compares herself to a dog at the table of a master. Jesus responds by praising her great faith and fulfills her deep desire. Somehow this non-Israelite woman intuits that this harrowing situation is not dumb suffering. She senses that the door of God's family is, in Jesus, being opened to her and her loved ones. She trusts she is at the Lord's table, and her desires will be fulfilled and that all her sufferings — and her daughter's, too — will lead a great banquet. In our sufferings this week, the Lord wants us to treat him less like a genie in a bottle and more like the Master who has taken us — lost little dogs that we are — into his home forever. Trust that and keep praying in the face of evil.
