LIVING RADICAL SOLIDARITY

An excerpt from Most Reverend Michael F. Burbidge statement on Respect Life Month 2023

Since 1973, the year the Supreme Court legalized abortion nationwide in *Roe v. Wade*, the month of October has been set aside by the U.S. bishops as a time to focus on protecting God's precious gift of human life. While we thank God that the terrible reign of Roe has ended, we also recognize that abortion still continues in most states and is aggressively promoted at the federal level. A great many prayers, sacrifices, and good works are still desperately needed to transform a culture of death into a culture of life. Our public witness, our marching, and our advocacy must continue, yet laws alone will not end the tragedy of abortion.

While ending legalized abortion remains our preeminent priority, the most immediate way to save babies and mothers from abortion is to thoroughly surround mothers in need with lifegiving support and personal accompaniment. This is radical solidarity. St. John Paul II first defined "radical solidarity" in this way: "In firmly rejecting 'pro-choice' it is necessary to become courageously 'pro woman,' promoting a choice that is truly in favor of women. ...

Being in radical solidarity with women who are pregnant or raising children in difficult circumstances means putting our love for them into action and putting their needs before our own. Pope Francis reminds us that solidarity "refers to something more than a few sporadic acts of generosity. It presumes the creation of a new mindset," a transformation within our own hearts...

Our initiative, WalkingWithMoms.com provides easy-to-follow, step-by-step instructions to help transform our parishes into places of welcome, support, and assistance for pregnant and parenting mothers facing difficulties.

And so, this October, I invite all Catholics to think about building a culture of life in terms of radical solidarity. We are the Church. Our prayers, witness, sacrifices, advocacy, and good works are needed now, more than ever. We are the hands and feet of Christ in the world today and we each have a personal responsibility to care for one another.



FIDELITY YIELDS PEACE

27th Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year A



One of the greatest fruits produced from a life lived in fidelity to Christ Jesus and the teachings of the Catholic Church is **peace**. If peace is lacking in our lives as Catholics, in our societies, in the Church, and in the world, then we would do well to ask ourselves in what ways we have ceased to be faithful to the Lord, to rely on

Him in everything, and to remember His goodness.

Faithfulness to God should bring us peace because, by living according to God's commands, we allow Him to be in charge of our lives, trusting that He wants for us all the good things that St. Paul describes in his letter to the Philippians: what is true, honorable, just, pure, gracious, excellent, praiseworthy. It is when we cease to allow God to be God for us that we find ourselves like the "wild grapes" of the first reading, left to their own destruction, not because God (the owner of the vineyard) does not care, but because He respects our free will.

It is always good to take a few moments each day to reflect on our lives and see where we have tried to be faithful to God and where we have failed. Then, we should trustingly offer both our strivings and our failures to the Lord, awaiting His mercy and asking for His assistance.

Just as the owner of the vineyard in the Gospel sent His son, so did God the Father send us His Son Jesus to help us along our way. We are not alone. We have God on our side. We have Christ Who strengthens and accompanies us. God sees our efforts and our good will, and He will make up for what is lacking if necessary. Let us – like children – trust in God, be faithful to Him, and await His help and intervention in our families, societies, Church, and world. And let our hearts remain in peace because what people "has a God as near to them as the Lord, our God, is to us whenever we call upon Him?" (*Deut 4:7*).







Strong feelings may surface months, and even years after the person died. The goal of this group is to help you understand your feelings are normal; guide you in learning about the grief process; and give you a safe place to share your thoughts, feelings and experiences in a faith setting.

7 Ways to Support a Domestic Violence Survivor

Acts of domestic violence occur every day, mostly behind closed doors. Nicole Glaser, manager of Aurora Sinai Medical Center's healing and advocacy services, shares how you can support someone you know.

1. Learn the warning signs

Physical: Look for black eyes, swollen lips, red or purple marks on the neck, sprained wrists or bruised arms.

Emotional: Survivors may have low self-esteem, be overly apologetic, fearful, experience changes in sleeping/eating patterns, become anxious, have substance abuse issues or show signs of depression.

Behavioral: Look for changes in behaviors of becoming withdrawn, cancelling plans, being late, isolation and increased privacy about personal life.

This is not a comprehensive list and someone struggling does not have to experience all these symptoms to require help. If you suspect someone is struggling and requires immediate assistance, call the **National Domestic Violence Hotline-800-799-7233.**

2. Make time for them – Survivors may be more reluctant to initiate plans and would appreciate a friend taking the first step to connect. Creating time in your day for someone you suspect is suffering will generate trust and create a safe space for sharing.



3. Start a conversation – Once trust is established, you can initiate a conversation with the person. It's important to not push the subject and let it come naturally. You can assure the person you will be discreet and that you are concerned for their well-being. Try starting the conversation off with "I'm worried about you because…"

4. Listen without judgement – Be an active listener by asking clarifying questions and not providing advice. The person will tell you what they need if you give them the space to talk.

5. Validate survivors – Be sure to validate survivors in whatever they are feeling. You can say "I believe you" and "this is not your fault." All situations of domestic violence are complex and elicit a variety of emotions. Support them through feelings of anger, hope, fear, despair or even love.

6. Offer support – Once the conversation has ended, you can find ways to support the survivor. This can include locating/providing resources or creating a safety plan. It's important to respect the choices of the survivor and to not overstep. Understand that only the survivor can make their choice and that your only job is to support them through that decision.

7. Take care of yourself – It can be draining to actively listen to someone experiencing hardships so remember to listen to yourself too. Take time to exercise, get fresh air or anything to recharge.

Glaser likes to remind everyone that domestic violence is complicated, and someone might not be ready to leave.

"Leaving can often be most dangerous," says Glaser. "You can help support them by educating yourself on learning the signs of domestic violence and creating a safety plan."

It was said he picked up his head and kept preaching while walking many miles before reaching his burial site in a town later named after him. He is the patron saint of France and one of the Fourteen

Don't shortchange charity

In 2021, Pope Francis used today, World Mental Health Day, to pray for those "affected by mental disorders and also the victims, often young, of suicide." This June, Francis mentioned teen suicide again, decrying a "culture that leads young people to think that they are 'losers." Francis also emphasized the basic human right to medical care and social services—so critical for mental health—but he also pointed to us individual Christians, who in our "haste" don't often stop long enough to care for each other. "It is easy to delegate charity to others, yet the calling of every Christian"—according to Jesus' parable of the Good Samaritan —"is to become personally involved." His advice? Learn from Saint Thérèse of Lisieux, who said, "charity must not remain locked in the depths of one's heart."

TODAY'S READINGS: Jonah 3:1-10; Luke 10:38-42 (462). "The Lord said to her in reply, 'Martha, Martha, you are anxious and worried about many things."

A shrine for the ages

In America's "first city," St. Augustine, Florida, many Catholics today will celebrate the feast of Our Lady of La Leche, dedicated to a Marian apparition first recognized during the time of the Spanish colonial empire. The devotion, depicting Mary nursing the infant child Jesus, traveled with settlers to Florida in the 16th century, and a shrine to her was built at Mission Nombre de Dios in the new colony of St. Augustine. The shrine is the oldest in the United States, having received canonical coronation in 2021, and is a popular pilgrimage site for those seeking intercession related to a pregnancy. Maybe today is the day for you to offer a special prayer for someone in your own life.

TODAY'S READINGS: Jonah 4:1-11; Luke 11:1-4 (463). "All the nations you have made shall come and worship you, O Lord, and glorify your name."

Thursday, Oct 12, 2023

Come as you are

Christians whose personalities would never be called pious or meek might take heart in Caryll Houselander (1901-54), whose death we commemorate today. She smoked, drank, and was said to have a sharp tongue. But people were drawn to her for good counsel, and Houselander's spiritual writing persists. A sample: "Love is most likely to spring from another's need for us, and the fact of spending ourselves for another always generates new life in us." With your own God-given personality, warts and all, take a step today toward building the Kingdom.

TODAY'S READINGS: Malachi 3:13-20b; Luke 11:5-13 (464). "And I tell you, ask and you will receive; seek and you will find."

Friday, Oct 13, 2023

The devil doesn't have a prayer

In an interview in *Exorcists against Satan* by Italian journalist Fabio Marchese Ragona, Pope Francis was asked about the devil. "It is possible that I get on the Devil's nerves," he said, "because I try to follow the Lord and do what the Gospel says. And that annoys him. At the same time, he is certainly happy when I commit some sin. He seeks man's failure, but he has no chance if there is prayer." It is a great mystery that God should permit diabolical activity, says the Catechism of the Catholic Church, "but we know that in everything God works for good with those who love him" (CCC 395). Take the simple steps of daily prayer and good works to keep the devil at bay.

TODAY'S READINGS: Joel 1:13-15; 2:1-2; Luke 11:15-26 (465). "If Satan is divided against himself, how will his kingdom stand?"

Saturday, Oct 14, 2023

Redeeming qualities

There was a profound division in the church during the thirdcentury pontificate of Callistus I. The pope believed and taught that even the most serious sins like murder and adultery could be absolved in a sincere confession. His position scandalized many church leaders in Rome who didn't agree. They believed that some sins were too serious to be forgiven, and they accused Callistus of laxity and sympathizing with heretics. Eventually Callistus prevailed and Confession became the healing sacrament for all sin, even the most serious. Thank our merciful God for guiding the church toward an ethic of redemption.

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GOSPEL MEDITATION:

October 8, 2023 27th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jesus' parables are much stranger than most people realize. This week is an attention-getting example. He tells the religious leaders a parable about a completely absurd situation. Blood-thirsty and insane tenants violently abuse and kill the servants of their landlord. Inexplicably, the owner keeps sending them more victims of increasing value — up to and including his own son. Weird.

Usually, we hear this parable and assume it's an allegory: Jesus is the murdered son, the servants the prophets, etc. Fair enough. But notice — and here is where the weirdness deepens — Jesus seems to disagree with the Pharisees' interpretation that the landowner should and will punish the inheritance-obsessed murderers. So, is Jesus praising the psychotic and greedy murderers?! You can imagine the furrowed brows and deriding laughter as the scoffing crowd shuffles away.

If we stay with this tough parable, perhaps this truth emerges: God wants us to have an over-the-top obsession with a totally undeserved inheritance. Of course, we are forbidden to use violence. But the parable's violence gets our attention because it highlights the crazy goodness of the landowner. Jesus reveals that God is not merely in the business of rewarding the good and punishing the bad. He is playing a much stranger game one marked by a kind of over-the-top mercy, a breathtaking giving of what is not deserved. What would our week look like if we embraced this kind of desire for God's kingdom on earth, even if others think we're nuts? This week let's seek God's kingdom with a passionate confidence in God's desire to give the good things we don't deserve.
