

Respect Life Corner

BECAUSE OF CHRIST, WE ARE THE PEOPLE OF LIFE AND FOR LIFE.

On March 25, 2020, the Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord, the Church celebrated the 25th anniversary of the papal encyclical Evangelium Vitae (The Gospel of Life). It highlights the **special and particular role of women in bearing the gift of life to the world.**

There are many challenges that expectant mothers may face, including lack of support from the father, financial strains, concerns about her own health or that of her child, and pressures from family and friends. An "unborn child is totally entrusted to the protection and care of the woman carrying him or her in the womb."³ Through Christ, we received the gift of the Gospel of Life in its fullness as we are the people of life and for life. It is our duty to proclaim the truth to the world, for "to proclaim Jesus is itself to proclaim life."⁴ Pope John Paul II tasked us with building a culture of life to combat the forces at work in the culture of death.

Pregnant and parenting moms in need are in our parishes and our neighborhoods, and the sources for help may not be apparent to those most needing support. Women facing challenging pregnancies should see the Church as a place where they can find such help, especially with its extensive social services dedicated to meeting the needs of people in crisis. In honor of Evangelium Vitae's 25th anniversary, the U.S.C.C.B. Committee on Pro-Life Activities launched a nationwide effort: **Walking with Moms in Need.** Through this program, the Church is being asked to respond to Pope John Paul II's call and honestly assess the pastoral and practical assistance that it provides to pregnant moms and families in need and how effective it is in communicating such help.

Where life is involved, charity must be profoundly consistent. It cannot tolerate bias and discrimination, for **human life is sacred and inviolable**..."We need, then, to 'show care' for all life and for the life of everyone."⁸ Pope John Paul II highlights the Church's incredible history of service and charity throughout the centuries to those abandoned and forgotten by society. He urges that "every Christian community, with a renewed sense of responsibility, must continue to write this history."⁹



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We, the Catholic bishops of Illinois, write with a sense of urgency. Unless the General Assembly acts to renew the Invest in Kids scholarship program, more than 9,000 children currently relying on this program to attend a non-public school may have their educational path disrupted. Without an extension of the program in Illinois law now, no scholarships will be awarded for the school year that will begin in September 2024. Most of these children will have to leave the school their families determined was their best chance to receive a high-quality education in a safe and wholesome learning environment. This is an injustice that should and can be avoided, but only if the General Assembly acts when it reconvenes on October 24, 2023.

Invest in Kids has proven to be a beacon of hope for thousands of Illinois students and their families. Children receiving Invest in Kids scholarships come from lower-income families who could not otherwise afford tuition at the Catholic or another non-public school that is the best fit for their child. Childhood is a limited time in the life of a human being and primary and secondary education is not something that can be put off to some future date when it is convenient for adults. This is our one chance to offer these Illinois children a good start. Please help keep education options available and a brighter future possible by contacting your state senator and state representative and telling them to continue the Invest in Kids Program.

Since its inception six years ago, Invest in Kids has generated overwhelmingly positive results. Nearly 40,000 scholarships have been awarded to students attending non-public schools across Illinois. Demand for scholarships is very high - for every scholarship granted, three students are turned down due to lack of funds. Contrary to what you may have heard, this is not a voucher program, nor does it take state funds away from the public schools. These scholarships are funded through contributions from donors who receive a tax credit for their donation on their Illinois state income tax.

What can you do to help? Please contact your state senator and state representative to let them know of your support for extending the Invest in Kids tax credit scholarship program in Illinois. We also encourage you to urge your fellow parishioners to do the same. Our collective voice is vital to the continued help for Illinois families. DEACON DON'S UGANDA UPDATE ON MISSION SUNDAY



It was 10 years ago as Our Lady of the Wayside parish helped send Deacon Don Grossnickle with a "heart on fire and feet on the move" to visit and help start a mission in Uganda East Africa. His work began supporting nurse midwife Teopista Nakawundu (Mother Teo) who had financially struggled for 30 years running a mostly charity maternity clinic. Running a healthcare business as a "Good Samaritan" meant she only received payment from approximately 30% of the patients she treated. The clinic was threatened with bankruptcy as she became too generous, giving away free care to the poor. As a Uganda tourist, Deacon Don visited the clinic and witnessed six mothers connected to IV drips, being treated for complicated malaria that threatened their vital organs, He was moved

into action. The challenge was daunting. What could just one American Deacon do to help? What kind of miracle would it take to support this saintly nurse midwife bent on saving the lives of moms and babies? Tucked away in dark rooms and unnoticed, thousands of miles away, these mothers urgently needed help. In response, Wayside parishioners helped with donations initially and, later, the idea to build sustainable businesses to benefit the clinic was considered.

Deacon Don returned to Uganda and took a critical look at how existing business practices were preventing the future ability to provide care for destitute mothers and babies. A systematic business rescue plan was forged by a local team of

leaders. The plan took advantage of startup incubator research combined with available studies of microfinance investing. The plan was to seek US donor investors who would help launch a small pig farm on land owned by the clinic. Profits from a sustainable income stream would then create a local village charity fund that would, in turn, cover a good number of the clinic's visits. Fortunately, \$5,000 was supplied by a St. Raymond Catholic Parish Lent donation. This provided a "forgivable loan" to help launch the agribusiness. The only repayment required was periodical progress reports to the US donors.

Soon after, another microfinance business plan was set in motion to create a diagnostic laboratory for the clinic. A \$500 clinical microscope and a \$7,000 high-tech ultrasound system were donated. Updated facilities boosted the attractiveness to new [paying] patients and, eventually, 50-100 came daily, seeking access to healthcare. Two dairy cows were then added to the farm enterprises and milk sales boosted the growing sources of charity fund income.

Following the success of the initial plan – from 2014 through the present – Deacon Don's ongoing mission work continued with Mother Teo in Nakifuma Village. In 2018, Deacon Don and US friends organized a 501(c)(3) charity. In 2019 a team of volunteers raised funds to remodel the clinic and, in 2020, \$25,000 in donations were raised. These funds helped equip a government-approved mini hospital surgical center.

And now there is even more good news to this story! More miracles organized by Deacon Don and friends are happening in many other Uganda clinic locations. The MAAPFoundation is proudly exporting its first clinic's mission success to 20 other financially strapped clinics seeking help. Note: It takes \$5,000 to start a small income-producing farm (pigs, poultry, fish). Each farm startup boosts the number of moms and babies whose lives can be saved.

Your Diet Can Impact ADHD Symptoms



The National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH) estimates 3-5% of the population has attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD). ADHD is an ongoing pattern of attention and/or hyperactivity-impulsivity that interferes with function or development. Symptoms include inattention, hyperactivity and impulsivity

Since there is no cure for ADHD, typical treatments and therapies include medication, psychotherapy, education or training, or a combination of treatments. But there has been an increasing interest in how diet and supplements can play a part in treatment by reducing symptoms.

"Diets high in sugar may increase inattention and make ADHD symptoms worse," says Amy Perdomo, nurse practitioner specializing in psychiatry at the Aurora Behavioral Health Center in Green Bay, Wis.

Certain foods can keep a person's energy and blood sugar level stable and improve concentration:

- **Protein-rich foods** Protein prevents spikes in blood glucose levels, which can surge increases in hyperactivity. Food rich in protein includes meat, poultry, fish, beans, eggs and nuts.
- **Complex carbohydrates** These help prevent blood sugar spikes, make you feel fuller longer and encourage better sleep. Foods that contain complex carbohydrates include fruits, vegetables, and whole-grain bread, pasta and brown rice.
- Vitamins and minerals Studies link ADHD with low levels of certain micronutrients. Though it is unclear if these can improve symptoms, they are still essential in your diet; iron, zinc, magnesium, vitamin B-6 and vitamin D.
- **Omega-3 fatty acids** These may improve attention, focus, motivation and working memory in children with ADHD. Some sources of omega-3 fatty acids include salmon, tuna, walnuts, chia seeds and flax seeds.

It is important to eat balanced meals!

- Schedule regular meal and snack times, especially since routine is important for children with ADHD.
- Do not skip meals as this could lead to blood sugar crashes and excessive junk food consumption.
- Keep plenty of healthy foods on hand for a quick snack.
- Speak to a doctor about taking a multivitamin and multimineral supplement, which may be especially helpful for picky eaters and people with nutrient deficiencies.

In general, the best diet for people with ADHD is the diet that doctors recommend for most other people — one that is rich in fruits, vegetables, whole grains, healthful fats and lean proteins. It should include limited amounts of saturated fats and junk foods.

For those with ADHD, diet is so important says Perdomo, "Two-thirds of children will have clinically significant symptoms into young adulthood, therefore education on diet from childhood through adulthood is very important."

Live your vocation inspired by Mary

When Saint Anthony Mary Claret was appointed archbishop to Cuba in 1849, he initiated practical changes to help the working poor: He taught effective farming methods so families could feed themselves while making a living, began credit unions, and set up vocational training for disadvantaged youth. All of this angered wealthy land owners, who expected cheap labor to help them plunder the land for sugar as a lucrative cash crop. GOSPEL MEDITATION:

October 22, 2023 29th Sunday in Ordinary Time

With little more than a year until the United States' national elections, I find myself feeling, like many Catholics, both dread and energized. Dread, because our democratic republic can be a messy endeavor and campaigns a long, nasty, and unedifying slog; energized, because hope for positive societal change can be enticing and engaging. As a pastor, I see similar conflicting attitudes in those whom I serve. How can Catholics best engage our political arena in a way which is truly helpful and worthwhile?

This weeks' gospel reading offers wisdom in this regard. Jesus says, "Render therefore to Caesar the things are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's." This riddle forces us to answer for ourselves a hidden question: what is the relationship between political and divine authority? Two common but false answers lead to mischief. If we answer that the two are equivalent, politics becomes our absolute authority. This happens whenever religion is slave to the state, as in the travesty of the pro-Nazi German Christian movement in the 1930s and 40s. It also usually occurs when there is an official state religion. If we answer that the two are totally unrelated, we end up with an unchecked aggressive secularist state as we often experience now. Thus, religion becomes a weak and private pastime.

What's a better alternative? At our best, Christians hold that political authority does indeed have its own legitimate autonomy but is nested within God's all-encompassing authority. Think, for example, of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s respect for politics while also being able to criticize unjust human laws because he recognized a higher heavenly law. In other words, Caesar owns politics — and God owns Caesar. So, we should allow Jesus' words to lead us to have a deep respect and willingness to peacefully engage in politics without making that engagement our religion. We bring our faith to bear on our politics knowing confidently that Caesar isn't God — but he is indeed God's.
