# **Hidden Treasures: Finding God in our Life**



#### The Search

The pace of life in today's world is ever increasing. It gets more and more difficult to focus on what are the important values in our life. To gain some insight into what's really important, I looked back over some of our recent Sunday gospels and saw some insights to help us focus on the "treasures" God offers to all of us. I would like to share some thoughts with you.

In the October 22 gospel, when the Pharisees asked Jesus what should they give to Caesar, Jesus responds, "render to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God, what is God's. At first we may think – "Caesar has been dead for two thousand years, that's not an issue for us.

But NO! Many "Caesars" are alive in our world – the athlete who makes millions of dollars and can live an opulent life style; the CEO who makes mega-millions and grudgingly gives a pittance to the employees. Today's entertainers are paid millions – for what? These are just three examples of the "Caesars" in our world. What are some of the examples of "Caesars" you see in our world?

Recently we saw the example of the rich landowner who stores his excess crops to be used at a later date and God says, "You fool, tonight your life will be demanded of you!"

We're told that it's "more blessed to give than to receive." Where do we see that in or life?

The above graphic shows piles of gold (the world's "treasures). Behind this are two doors (the gates to heaven). Are we distracted by the world's shiny, but ephemeral glitter? Or do we search for the **Hidden Treasure** behind the closed doors?

#### The Hidden Treasures in our life

Each one of us needs to ask "What are we rendering to God?" God gives us unconditional love and expects us to share our blessings with those in need.

#### "St. Mark's" becomes "Our Lady of Unity"

As many of you already know, the St. Mark's parish is merging with the neighboring parishes of St. Helen and St. Aloysius. The new name of the parish is **Our Lady of Unity**. The name is appropriate as it reflects the three parishes **unifying** to share their **time**, **talents and treasures** under the guidance of the Blessed Virgin Mary. OLW is fortunate to join with them to share in God's name.

For approximately thirty years, OLW and St. Mark's have been "sharing parishes"- especially with the **"Food Drive."** This will continue with the same guidelines — parishioners will drop off non-perishable food on the second Sunday of the month; then on the following Saturday, volunteers deliver the food to the *Our Lady of Unity* community. Don Piergalski and his team coordinate this ministry.

Of equal importance is the **Christmas Giving Tree**. This also is a long-established relationship. **Our Lady of Unity** will provide a list of families who need financial assistance. A Christmas tree will be set up in our church and parishioners can take a name to provide a "gift" for that family. Patty Haase and her team coordinate this ministry.

The name has changed but the spirit lives on – and the **need** of the community has increased. But here we will see **The Hidden Treasures** of God's love.

#### ACTIONS SPEAK LOUDER...

31st Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year A

This Sunday's readings remind us of the importance of the role of priests, who are supposed to be the men of God. The role of the priest in the Old Testament was to offer a sacrifice on behalf of the people of Israel and to give an example of holy life with God. We hear in the first reading, however, how the priests were unfaith-

ful, and how God rebuked them. God speaks through the prophet Malachi directing this warning to the priests of Jerusalem Temple:

"And now, O priests, this commandment is for you: If you do not listen, if you do not lay it to heart, to give glory to my name, says the LORD of hosts, I will send a curse upon you and of your blessing I will make a curse."

Similarly, in the Gospel, we hear an echo of the prophet Malachi. But this time it is the Lord Jesus, Himself, who rebukes the scribes and the Pharisees who were supposed to help the Chosen People know the Holy Scriptures, lead them to a deeper understanding of God and eventually to the recognition of the Messiah. Instead, the scribes and Pharisees were using their position to rule over peoples' hearts and minds while keeping them in the dark. In this case, the so-called religious people used their authority either for their personal gain or because of their pride. Like the prophet Malachi, Jesus is very straightforward while directing His message. Here too, Jesus pinpoints the sins of the scribes and the Pharisees: they do their piety to show off — "all their works are performed to be seen." Consequently, they cannot or do not want to hear Jesus' message. Hence, the Lord directly warns the people: "do and observe all things whatsoever they tell you, but do not follow their example. For they preach but they do not practice."

Since currently there are so few young men entering the seminaries or religious life, and the crisis among the priests is too obvious, **I** ask you to please pray unceasingly for vocations to the priesthood. Remember that without priests there will be no sacraments: no baptisms, no confessions, no anointing of the sick, no holy matrimony, no Eucharist and, eventually, no Church! Please pray also for the priests you know – that we all may truly be holy men of God. Thank you for your prayers and support. Blessings to all.

Pull up to the garage, where large totes will be available for your donations, or pop your trunk and our volunteers will collect the food.



Most people who are deeply grieving worry whether they are grieving "correctly." If this is you, perhaps in your moments of deep sadness you wonder what the difference is between grief and depression. This may be compounded if others offer comments such as "You seem to be holding up well" when, on the inside, you are not. It is important to understand the difference between clinical depression and the naturally deep sadness that accompanies grief.

Grief is the reaction to loss—it is comprised of all the reactions you are experiencing, not just emotionally but spiritually, physically, cognitively and socially. There's a clear correlation between how much you grieve and how much you love. Everyone grieves differently based on their personality, previous losses, the relationship to the loved one, and their environment, just to name a few influencing factors. This deep sadness serves a specific purpose. When you have those times of deep sadness you naturally turn inward, into yourself. You slow down and become enveloped with a protective layer that causes you to lose some of your focus on the outside world.

The key to this deep grief or sadness is to tend to it. In today's fast-paced world, many tend to block out or shove away times when grief hits you front and center. Doing this doesn't bypass the grief; it is still there, waiting to be tended to at a later date. It is far better to tune into these times telling yourself to pause and reflect, because the answers for what you need are there within you. By paying attention to this deep sadness, you will begin to understand what you need, in that moment and going forward, to move beyond those feelings. The moments will ebb and flow—they come and go. When these episodes occur, you may question "How do I go on?" Yet over time, the moments will become less frequent. In between these times of deep sadness, most people are able to experience some pleasures, such as the support of a good friend or the love of a grandchild.

In grief you may have a bad day or bad moment, but it eventually passes. Clinical depression, on the other hand, is not intermittent. It is persistent, ongoing, never changing. Depression is accompanied by a feeling of hopelessness and apathy. One will continually question "Why go on?" While deep sadness is usually more focused on feelings surrounding the loss, clinical depression often has a negative self-focus which can become distorted with feelings of worthlessness and guilt. If you find you have lost all interest in everything you previously cared about and can find no joy or meaning in any of the moments of your life, you may be experiencing clinical depression. If your symptoms are not going away or if you have a history of depression, it is important to reach out to a mental health professional or your family doctor. Depression is treatable, often with ongoing counseling and sometimes with medication. Don't suffer in silence, reach out. There are always others who care.

#### All paths designed to lead to holiness

Some people hear their call early in life, and it's loud and clear. Others grapple longer and harder with figuring out their vocation. Regardless of where you fall on that spectrum of discernment, and no matter what state of life God intends for you, keep in mind during this National Vocation Awareness Week (Nov. 5-11) that we are all called in essence to the same thing. Let the words of Carmelite nun Saint Thérèse of Lisieux to her friend upon her marriage reassure you: "The road we are following is different, however, the goal is the same purpose: to become holy in the way God has traced out for us."

#### **Tuesday, Nov 07, 2023**

#### Honor wise council

On this day in 680, the Third Council of Constantinople convened. Ecumenical councils summon a representative constituency of church leadership to settle important questions and fine-tune church teaching. Earliest councils, beginning in 325, solidified basics of Christian faith, often tackling heresies about the true nature of Jesus Christ. Later councils wrestled with institutional growing pains. Let us be grateful that our ancestors cared about the deposit of faith enough to gather and debate at length in order to hand down to future generations such as ours the best the tradition has to offer.

TODAY'S READINGS: Romans 12:5-16b; Luke 14:15-24 (486). "We, though many, are one Body in Christ and individually parts of one another."

#### Wednesday, Nov 08, 2023

#### Act decisively for justice

Today, we remember our forebear Joseph Rummel, the longtime archbishop of New Orleans during the era of Jim Crow segregation in the Deep South. As head of the diocese with one of the largest black populations in the nation, Rummel set out to desegregate local Catholic parishes and schools, including the archdiocesan seminary, beginning in 1948. After a letter from local segregationist Catholics to the pope was rebuffed by the holy father, Rummel declared all parochial schools desegregated in 1962. Famously, he later excommunicated several vocal holdouts

who protested his move. Where is such decisive action against racism among bishops today? We are all responsible for opposing injustice. How will you act for the common good?

TODAY'S READINGS: Romans 13:8-10; Luke 14:25-33 (487). "You shall love your neighbor as yourself. Love does no evil to the neighbor; hence, love is the fulfillment of the law."

#### Thursday, Nov 09, 2023

#### Let the good times roll

Catholics have lots of words with their own twists, and one of them is "feast." While we don't all sit down to a giant meal for every "feast," in some corner of the world, Catholics may well be doing just that. In church language, "feast" means something special is celebrated on a particular day. Feasts range from the death days of saints, to events in Jesus' life, to the foundation of a church with a special history (such as today's feast of the Lateran Basilica). Many feasts have special followings in particular cultures. Let feast days remind you that sometimes devotion also calls for a good party!

FEAST OF THE DEDICATION OF THE LATERAN BASILICA TODAY'S READINGS: Ezekiel 47:1-2, 8-9, 12; 1 Corinthians 3:9c-11, 16-17; John 2:13-22 (671). "His disciples recalled the words of Scripture, Zeal for your house will consume me."

Known for his accessible preaching style, Pope Leo I helped his fifth-century flock and Christians down through the ages understand more fully the true nature of Christ and his saving gifts. By becoming human, explains Leo, "Jesus assumed the form of a servant without the stain of sin—enhancing what was human, not detracting from what was divine." As children of the light, we share in God's own nature. Therefore, our heads and hearts should reflect this holy inheritance. Or put simply by Leo: "Christian, remember your dignity."

#### A veteran worthy of his day

Because Saint Martin of Tours (c. 320-397) was the son of a Roman army officer, he was required by law to serve in the Roman military. Two years after his conversion to Christianity he announced, "I am the soldier of Christ: it is not lawful for me to fight." He was arrested and charged with cowardice. So he volunteered to go into battle unarmed. Before he could make good on his offer, he was discharged from the military. This Veterans Day, we can remember those, like Saint Martin and Venerable Emil Kapaun, Army chaplain, who, for the sake of Christ, go into battle armed only with the love of Christ.

#### **GOSPEL MEDITATION:**

#### November 5, 2023 31st Sunday in Ordinary Time

Last Easter season a new convert to Catholicism at my parish asked me with a grave tone in her voice: "Why do we call priests 'father' if Jesus says, 'Call no man on earth your father, for you have one Father, who is in heaven'?" Thinking myself clever, I asked, "Do you think it's okay to call someone your 'teacher' or 'mister' or 'dad'?" She said, "Yes, I do." I responded, "Well, Jesus seems to forbid that, too. So, it's obviously hyperbole that he's using." She thought for a moment and declared, "Then I will stop using those words, too!" And she walked away. Not the outcome I was seeking.

We shouldn't be too hasty in dismissing this complaint voiced by many non-Catholics. The expression "father" for ordained priests is not honorary for the individual man. The priest's fatherhood doesn't begin or end in him at all. Rather, the title "father" indicates that he is a sacramental sign of God's Fatherhood revealed in Jesus. I can tell you, as a very unworthy bearer of that title, we should give and receive that title with some trepidation (because of God's awesomeness) and with a little sense of humor (because of the lowliness of the men with the title).

The longer I'm a priest, the more I'm comfortable with people not using the title "father" and just calling me "John." After all, only God is Father in the truest sense. At the same time, Jesus has brought the Father close to us, very close. We honor this closeness in some men with the title "father." Who are the priests in your life whom Christ has sent to you? How wonderful that Christ has surrounded us with humble signs of his Father's love. It's good to celebrate that love with gratitude for the priests in our lives.
