

CHRIST THE KING

34th Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year A

On this last Sunday of ordinary time in the Church year, we celebrate Christ Our King. Jesus Christ is present in the Church all of the time. He is our Head, our Leader, our King and our Lord. He is present in the community of the faithful. He is present through the Sacraments. And He is present par excellence in the Eucharist.

When we participate in the Eucharistic sacrifice of the Mass, we discover the Real presence of Jesus. Therefore, it is very important to realize who Jesus is and what happens on the altar during the Mass, because Jesus in body, soul, and divinity is really present. Just imagine how a convert to Catholicism must feel when he receives Jesus in the Eucharist for the first time. He may receive His Body and Blood with trembling hands and lips. This person's faith that it is really God is alive because he really believes that the Living God enters his or her heart. He finds himself face to face with the living God, with the King of the Universe. When we find ourselves before God who is a Mystery, then we too should tremble before His Love and His Majesty.

We have just celebrated Thanksgiving, a day to recall all that we are grateful for. Above all else, let us be grateful for Our King and Lord—Our Great God—Who humbled Himself by becoming a man so that we could receive Him in the Eucharist. If we are grateful from the depths of our hearts, then Jesus Christ the King will be able to give us many more special graces.

Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament requires a guardian present for each of the 70 hours. Please visit https://bit.ly/3Qzy8lu or scan to register.






Giving Tree 2023





Are You Storing Leftovers Safely?

Whether you prep meals like a pro or you overestimated how much pasta to make, storing food is unavoidable. But are you doing it safely?

As sustainability experts, we recommend that you follow these tips to safely store your food:

1. Choose the right storage containers

Look for containers that are airtight and food grade. If made from plastic, check for a "BPA-free" label. BPA, or Bisphenol A, is a chemical found in hard plastics. It is a known endocrine disruptor, according to the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences. Many manufacturers have since removed BPA from their products. You should also avoid containers with recycling codes 3, 6 or 7, per the American Academy of Pediatrics' recommendations. Containers with these codes contain phthalates, styrene and bisphenols, respectively.

2. Use and care for plastic containers properly

Recycling code 1 indicates single-use plastic, such as disposable water bottles. These plastics are only designed to be used once, so repeated use is generally not advised. Microwaving, dish washing or exposing plastic containers to any kind of prolonged sunlight may damage them, causing them to leach chemicals into food or liquid. Reheat leftover food in a microwave-safe container when possible. Hand washing plastic containers limit heat exposure and can prolong its lifespan.

3. Replace as needed and recycle when possible

The lifespan of a plastic container depends on its use. If a plastic container has been repeatedly exposed to high heat, is cracked, stained or otherwise damaged, it might be time to replace. While washing, look for signs of damage and lids that no longer seal properly. Many plastic containers can be recycled, so be sure to recycle them appropriately at the end of their lifespan. Not sure how to recycle them? Check with your local municipality's guidelines.

4. Use plastic alternatives when possible

Did you know you swallow about five grams of microplastics every week? Most plastics do not biodegrade. Instead, they break down into increasingly smaller microplastics, which are digested by humans and wildlife, according to a study commissioned by the World Wildlife Fund. To reduce your plastic use and waste, consider non-plastic alternatives, such as glass or stainless-steel containers. Cling wrap and plastic zip-lock bags can be swapped with reusable silicone bags, sustainably sourced beeswax wrap, or cloth or net produce bags. These alternatives may cost more up front but may end up saving you money with their longer lifespans.

Overall, these precautions will help you store leftovers properly to help keep you and your family safe.

Conversion can be revolutionary

British poet Alice Meynell, who died on this day in 1922, converted to Catholicism while recovering from chronic illness, and her writing thereafter turned to religious subjects. She married a Catholic newspaper publisher and founded a Catholic suffragist organization. When a British priest preached against giving women the right to vote because it would risk "bringing a revolution of the first magnitude," Meynell replied, "...the vaster the magnitude of the revolution, the better." One hundred years after her death, the struggle for equality continues. How do the teachings of Jesus inform your work for justice?

Little lamb, who made thee?

Happy birthday to the English poet William Blake, born this day in 1757. Though not Catholic, he's inspired great Catholic poets and many of his poems—like "Jerusalem"—became hymns. Trappist monk Thomas Merton wrote his master's thesis on Blake, emphasizing his spiritual significance in *Seven Storey Mountain*: "His rebellion ... was fundamentally the rebellion of the saints. It was the rebellion of the lover of the living God, the rebellion of the one whose desire of God was so intense and irresistible that it condemned, with all its might, all the hypocrisy and petty sensuality and skepticism and materialism" of organized religion. Pray for all who search for God but find obstacles in religious institutions—and enjoy Blake's "The Lamb."

Gracious encounters of the digital kind

Did you buy anything on Cyber Monday? Did you make a charitable donation yesterday, on Giving Tuesday? Whether you did or not, this week's digital focus continues today, which is recognized as Electronic Greetings Day. Pope Francis' 2020

encyclical *Fratelli Tutti* considers how the internet is a powerful tool and how it's our job to use it in a way that makes the world better. "We need constantly to ensure that present-day forms of communication are in fact guiding us to generous encounter with others," he writes. Make time today to send an encouraging email or ecard to someone who needs to hear from you.

Tradition has it that Andrew was crucified on an X-shaped cross because he felt unworthy to die on a cross identical to Christ's. Andrew led the way in accepting Jesus' invitation to follow him. How will your life today respond to that invitation?

St. Vincent Medical Center in Manhattan, now closed, was in the eye of the AIDS epidemic storm of the 1980s and 1990s. A Catholic hospital run by the Sisters of Charity, St. Vincent opened its doors to care for those who were sick and dying from AIDS. Some staff disagreed with this stance and left. But not the sisters. They stayed true to Jesus' command to care for the suffering, especially those cast aside by society. They entered into dialogue with the gay community, activists, and hospital administrators to better understand their patients and how best to serve them. May we remember their unwavering commitment and compassion—and do likewise.

International Day for the Abolition of Slavery, raise your voice in a phone call, email, or letter to elected officials. Let's put an end to this!

GOSPEL MEDITATION:

November 26, 2023 Solemnity of Christ the King

In May 2023, for the first time in almost three quarters of a century, a monarch was crowned in England. A few days later a friend of mine scoffed, "What a waste of time and energy! What is the point of a king?"

I'm a proud American who wants neither theocracy nor monarchical restoration. I like our democratic republic. But the coronation of King Charles reminded me of something needed in every person and community: confidence in the future. The king's most basic role is to symbolize the unity of the nation. In England, the parliament members handle many of the practical duties of governance. But the king or queen can do what they cannot: embody in a single person the reality and future of a whole nation. To say, "this is our king" is to say, "we exist as a community, and we have a future." Kingship isn't primarily about the power of one person or family. It's about the enduring identity and unity of the whole.

To say Christ is our King is to say we exist as a people. We are one in him. We are, and we will be as long as he is. And since he will be our risen king forever, together we have a future filled with hope. Even the best countries will finally fall. But Christ and his Church will endure forever. What good news! It's not a waste of time to crown a king. We do it all the time. Let's be sure to crown the right one — the one whose kingdom never ends.
