



First Sunday of Advent - Year B

St. Paul the Apostle to the nations characterizes the pagans by saying that they do not have God and they do not have hope. As we begin Advent today, we should ask ourselves: Are we Christians and Catholics a people of hope?

Those who believe deeply do not live in an illusion regarding what

is going to happen in their future. Instead, the Christian knows more than what he reads in the newspaper or sees on television. With joy and faith, the Christian awaits the One Who will come again.



The First Sunday of Advent: The Candle of Hope




VIDEO: A New Day for Men

How to Cope with Common Holiday Stressors



For many, the holiday season can be both a time of great joy and of stress and anxiety. Whether it is finding the ultimate gift, cooking the juiciest turkey, making ends meet or battling the season's doldrums, this time of year can be hard.

"A lot of the holidays is trying to figure out how to manage the stress—things are hectic, you have a lot of demands on your time and there are the pressures of all the parties and events and buying things," says Sarah Katula, an advanced practice psychiatric nurse at Advocate Good Samaritan Hospital in Downers Grove, IL. "It can be hard to pay atten-

tion to what's most important - the meaning and value of the holiday, whatever that means to you."

Katula offers a few common stressors and some advice to handle each:

The stress of tradition and making things "perfect" – People can put a lot of pressure on themselves during the season in pursuit of the perfect holiday. "For many people, there is this need to be perfect around this time," she says. Instead, try to manage expectations for yourself and those around you. The goal could simply be to have an enjoyable holiday with plenty of time for relaxation. Similarly, families should make time for holiday traditions but be open to making room for new ones or tweaking old ones to make them more manageable, she says. "Families evolve and change over time," she says. "They need to be flexible and open and ready when a tradition may change."

Intense schedules and financials – Though we refer to our vacation time in December as a "holiday break", it sometimes doesn't feel like much of one. Different celebrations, services, obligations, shopping trips and seasonal traditions can eat up a lot of time and money.

"Self-care is really important," Katula says. "It's always important to get enough sleep, not drink too much, avoid overeating or eating too much sugar and to spend time with your friends." One solution for the financial burden is to consciously avoid overspending, opting for homemade gifts or shared experiences. Conversations with loved ones about the meaning of the holidays can also go a long way to manage pressure and expectations. Also, don't be afraid to say no, Katula says – setting limits and cutting back on commitments can help ensure you have enough holiday spirit to last throughout the season.

Loss of friends and family in the prior year – Holidays are frequently seen as a time to be with friends and family, which can be hard if a loved one is absent. "It can certainly be a difficult holiday for many," Katula says. "It can be a time for mourning or grieving. Try to ask how best to honor the people who have passed."

Holiday and winter depression – Whether it's an emotional trigger, additional stress, Seasonal Affective Disorder or other reasons, the holidays can sometimes be a driver of depression or other mental health issues, Katula says. She encourages people struggling to seek extra support if they find themselves in need, and for those in their lives to try to provide that extra support if asked or needed. "Take time for yourself," she says. "Continue taking your medications and stick as close as you can to the activities of daily living and structure." She also encourages those in therapy to consider additional appointments throughout the holiday season.

Family conflict – With holidays comes family, and for many, with family comes stress and fighting. Katula says the only way to face stress is to meet it with set boundaries and plans. Presenting the clear message that you are uninterested in getting involved in a conflict while still being present in the festivities can help head off conflicts before they escalate. She suggests having an exit plan when cornered by critical or stressful relatives.

Iconic inspiration

Think of how much sacred images of Jesus, Mary, angels, and the saints—in painting, stained glass, and sculpture—have filled your life and stimulated your spirit. You might have many sacred images throughout your home. Perhaps you can find them in different public places in your city. Our Catholic churches are certainly full of them. Think of how much they inspire and prompt you to momentary prayer, a fleeting lifting of your heart and mind to God as you pass by them, or to long stretches on your knees, deep in conversation. You can partly thank John Damascene, who defended holy images against iconoclasm, a movement in the eighth century that was opposed to the veneration of icons. Treasure the rich imagery of our tradition.

Be a light in the darkness

As Advent days grow ever darker, Isaiah offers hope: "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light" (Isa. 9:1). We Christians seek the Son's light, but we also take the Savior at his word when he describes us as the "light of the world" (Matt. 5:14). 'Tis the season, to celebrate those who shared their light, such as Rosa Parks, who co-led the Montgomery bus boycott beginning this day in 1955. Or Mary McLeod Bethune, who formed the National Council of Negro Women 20 years earlier. To quote Saint Isidore of Seville (who opened the Fourth Council of Toledo on this day in 633): "Just as we must love God in contemplation, so we must love our neighbor with action."

GOSPEL MEDITATION:

December 3, 2023 - 1st Sunday of Advent

Lately I've been listening to a science-based podcast on healthy daily living. The host frequently discusses the wide range of health benefits of sleep. So, each night I'm trying to get more, and better, slumber, and it's helping me feel energized. So, why in the world should we follow Christ's advice this week? "Watch therefore, for you do not know when the master of the house will come... lest he find you asleep." Isn't sleep, especially at midnight and cockcrow, a good thing?

Of course, it is. But the wakefulness the Lord calls us to is a deep, personal orientation to Him. A nightly vigil is therefore a metaphor for this, but it's not just that. We should give up real sleep in order to pray, too. This difficult practice is a time-tested way to foster wakefulness of heart. When we give up sleep to pray, it focuses us. We learn that life is not an endless series of days. You and I belong to the Lord — awake or asleep, in life and in death. Sooner or later, even our need for our physical sleep will pass away. And our attentiveness to God — that is, whether we are awaiting Him to meet us — will be all that matters.
