What kind of meaning does the Holy Family have for contemporary families: for mothers, fathers and children? To this family belonged the Child Jesus—a Child loved by Mary and Joseph. He, along with Mary and Joseph, created a union that was held together by respect and love. Difficulties and sufferings awaited this

Child and His parents, who had anticipated His coming. Yet, nothing could disturb them, because the Child Jesus knew that He was loved. He knew that He was the object of particular care. And His parents trusted and placed their hope in God. Mary and Joseph were ready to follow the Child Jesus along the way marked out by God. They were ready to accompany Him for His entire life. And this Child developed and grew in wisdom.

We can imagine that the life of the Holy Family is one of poverty and simplicity. Yet, it was full of love. Like any other child, Jesus had to learn to walk, to talk, to work, to pray and to love his parents. And like any other parents, Mary and Joseph had to learn how to be parents. We can imagine that Mary and Joseph surrounded Jesus with their care and love as they taught Him a sense of humor, how to relate to other people, how to cope with difficulties, and how to work.

Like the Holy Family, Our families also must be signs and sources of Love, where we are nurtured, cared for, and formed to face the difficulties and sufferings of life with hope.

Our families must be places of support and love—where each of us feels welcomed and grows in faith. The Holy Family is for us a sign of Love. For the rest of the world, the Holy Family might be a sign of contradiction. But for us, it is a sign of Love and a reminder of the Trinity. Therefore, let us try to follow the example of the Holy Family. Let us invite Mary, Joseph and Jesus into our homes so that we might learn from them how to live in a family of faith, of hope, and of love, especially in times of suffering and difficulties.

Grotto Action Update



The Knights of Columbus, Holy Rosary Council, are **in action** here at Our Lady of the Wayside. The Knights are more than just those guys in the funny hats and capes. At the request of Fathers Arthur and Gilbert, they are building a grotto on the south side of the church, located between the rectory stairs and the stairs leading to the priests sacristy. Landscaping is nearly complete.

The Grotto budget is \$30,000. The Knights secured the services of a landscape architect, horticulturist/artist, a tree removal service and a landscaper to insure the work is done properly. The statue of the Blessed Virgin (pictured), is scheduled to arrive from Italy next March. Target completion is May 1, 2024.

The Knights secured pledges and donations from numerous generous individuals and now ask for your help in meeting the goal. We still have invoices to pay and work to complete the project. You will see your donation to the Knights of Columbus **in action**, for years to come.

Before You Jump Into Your New Year's Resolutions, Try This

The beginning of a new year can be an exciting time. We start the year feeling motivated about all the big changes we'll make in the coming months. However, many of us find that motivation is fading by the end of February.

I truly believe that one of the biggest reasons we don't keep these resolutions is because we jump right in and end up feeling overwhelmed.



This year, take some time to come up with a plan that can help set you up for success. Here are a few steps to get started.

Try a positive change. When we start telling ourselves we can't do something, it feels a little restrictive and can actually be demotivating. By reframing the behavior as something healthy you can add to your life, you're starting on a more positive note that won't make you feel deprived. For example, if you want to stop eating dessert, try adding in more fruits and vegetables at meals first. If you want to stop watching tv at night, try adding in a walk or another form of physical activity. Start paying attention to the benefits of making these positive changes, and you'll feel more motivated to keep them going.

Figure out your real "why". When you think about your goal for the upcoming year, dig a little deeper and determine why this goal is important to you. For example, if your goal is to lose weight, think about how you will feel and what you can accomplish once you reach that goal. Maybe you want to be able to be more active with your family or feel more confident. Often, the underlying reason for wanting to reach that goal is more motivational because it connects us to our core values. When life starts to get busy, remembering your "why" can help you keep going.

Create a plan. Jumping right into a new behavior can end up being frustrating and overwhelming. Instead, try breaking your goal down into small, manageable steps. When working with health coaching clients, I ask them what actions they would need to take to accomplish their goal and then to pick the three most important. That's the starting point. Once you have those actions, you can turn them into short-term goals. Try weekly goals or monthly goals so that you start establishing habits and see some progress. As you start to accomplish these shorter-term goals, you'll build confidence towards reaching your overall goal.

Find a way to stay accountable. Tracking your goals helps you stay focused. I encourage clients to try writing in a journal so that they can also note what helped support them and what was challenging. Think of this as a learning opportunity. When you find that something supports your goal, you can use that strategy in the future. If something was challenging, try coming up with a plan to overcome that challenge if it comes up again. Many people also find it motivating to look back and see how far they've come during the year.

GOSPEL MEDITATION:

December 31, 2023 The Feast of the Holy Family

I remember the first time my older sister asked me if I wanted to hold her newborn son. Terrified, I told her I didn't think it was a good idea. My résumé had nothing to suggest I would be a qualified baby holder. But she warmly told me, "I'll help you hold him." It struck me that she is baby's mother. She is the one who decides who is qualified to hold him. I took him in my arms and soon I began to feel comfortable with that tiny little warm cooing creature in my arms, and soon I no longer feared holding him. Now, twenty-seven nieces and nephews later, holding a newborn child is one of the great joys of my life.

Do we sometimes think that Jesus is given only to the highly qualified, special religious people? In the Gospel of Luke today we hear about the presentation of the Lord in the temple. The newborn son of God is passed around like a baton in a relay race, not guarded like a precious jewel or a breakable china dish. We can see him going from the arms of Mary to Joseph, then to the priest performing the ceremony, then to Simeon the old man, then to Anna the old widow. Each one receiving him and then handing him to the next. A tidal wave of joy and thanksgiving follows wherever he is placed.

Believe me, you are qualified to hold Jesus in your arms. How can I say that with such confidence? Because the mother decides who is qualified. The Blessed Virgin, embodied in the Church, holds him out to you and me. She rejoices to place him in our arms to hold, and to hand him on, too.
