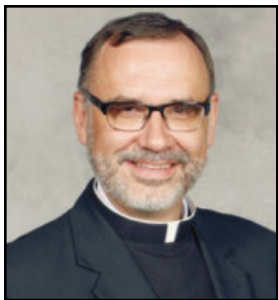

SEE THE STAR?

The Epiphany of the Lord - Year B

My brothers and sisters, in today's Gospel we encounter three reactions to the coming of Christ. The three magi from the East did not hear of the coming of the Messiah through the appearance of an angel. Rather, they connected the signs around them, and decided to follow the star to find the king. So, they left everything, and they

embarked on the difficult journey to Bethlehem in order to find the Lord. They were open to Christ and willing to persistently search for the hidden God for as long as it took to find Him.

The other group of people that we encounter in today's Gospel are the priests and scribes. Like the three magi from the East, the priest and scribes were aware of the signs. They were aware of Scripture in which the prophet Isaiah foretold the coming of the Messiah. They knew that the King would come from Bethlehem. Yet, my brothers and sisters, they did not believe that the prophecy was being fulfilled in their time. They knew, and yet they did not go to the stable to meet the Baby Jesus because they felt that they did not need Him. The priests and scribes did not believe that the Scripture was being fulfilled in their time, because they did not have the light of the new star of faith, which leads not only to God, but also inclines a person to seek and find God.

Finally, the last example we see in today's Gospel is that of Herod. When he learned about the newborn King in Bethlehem, Herod was filled with terror. He was so frightened that he would lose his power and his control of the people, that he commanded the murder of all of the baby boys in Bethlehem, hoping that Jesus would be among them.

Therefore, we see three different responses to Jesus' coming. The magi from the east were open to God, and they persistently sought the child Jesus so that might adore and worship Him. Although they knew through the prophecies that the newborn King would come to Bethlehem and would be born of a virgin, the priests and scribes were indifferent. They did not feel they needed Jesus, and they did not possess the true faith that leads to the Christ Child. Responding in the opposite way as the three magi, Herod was terrified upon hearing about the birth of the new King. Herod was so terrified that he commanded that Jesus be killed, so that there be no threat to his power and rule.

Today, we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany, the Manifestation and Revelation of God among us. Christ the Lord and Ruler has come. He comes through sacramental signs such as this very Eucharist. We also encounter Him through others who love us and who await our loving response. We here are all Catholics. The majority of us all possess a faith that has been handed down through the generations. Therefore, I would like to ask each of you: ***What is your attitude before God, before the Newborn King? In what ways do you, and don't you, accept Jesus into your life?***

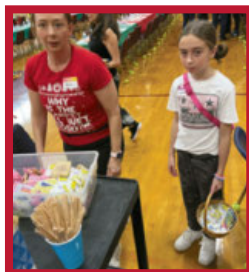


300+ CHRISTMAS MEALS SERVED!

Foot Care Shouldn't Hibernate Because It Is Winter

Pulling out the winter boots and putting away the sandals each winter does not mean you have to stop caring for your feet just because they are out of sight.

"Feet are the pillars of our body," says Dr. Kumar Raigaga, podiatrist, for Advocate Medical Group in Aurora, Ill. "If the feet are out of alignment or are in pain, then our ankles, knees, hips and back must compensate."

One common foot issue is foot bunions. Foot bunions are progressive deformities where the big toe starts turning outward towards the other four toes. This causes the inner first metatarsal bone to jut in, creating a pressure point when in shoes. In some cases, the bursa (the fluid sac which naturally goes between your bone joints and soft tissue) at that pressure point can become inflamed and painful as it rubs against your shoes.

Bunions can be hereditary, but the big toe also can turn outward due to ill-fitting shoes, injuries or trauma and arthritic changes. Usually, people with flat feet and low arches are susceptible to developing bunions because your foot joints are looser. Women are about ten times more prone to develop painful bunions than men. And women generally tend to have more foot problems than men because their shoes can be narrower and pointier. Plus, hormonal changes during pregnancies can further flatten and affect foot structure.

Bunion treatments range from quick solutions to surgery. Simple treatments include proper shoes with a wide enough toe area and supportive soles. Orthotics or arch supports can provide additional support to offload the pressure in the joint, and gel padding can cushion the area. Icing, anti-inflammatory medication and stretching or massages also can relieve pressure and swelling. However, if discomfort is not relieved with these do-it-yourself measures, it is recommended that you speak with a podiatrist or foot & ankle specialist to discuss cortisone injections and/or possible surgery if the bunion is severe.

So how do you avoid bunions in the first place? Dr. Raigaga shares tips on how to prevent not only bunions but future foot problems too:

- **Shoe shopping:** When trying on shoes, don't assume they will stretch out enough to become comfortable if they don't feel right the minute you try them, opt for a wider or larger size. Remember your feet change throughout your life, and they generally get wider and longer as we age. Pointy shoes and high heels can exacerbate bunions further.
- **Lose weight:** The average person takes about 5,000 steps a day, and our entire body weight is supported by the feet. Being overweight can exacerbate foot problems and losing weight can greatly reduce the pressure and strain on your feet with every step.
- **Stretch daily:** There are plenty of good foot stretches that don't take long to do. "As we have more birthdays, we generally get less flexible in our body," Raigaga says. "Overstraining stiffened joints, ligaments, tendons and muscles can create micro-tearing which can lead to chronic inflammation. Daily stretching is vital to avoid injury."

"Having daily foot pain is not normal," states Dr. Raigaga, "If there is no change to your pain after trying foot supports, over-the-counter meds, and massage, please seek help from a professional specialist to prevent further damage and continued pain."

Preparation of the Gifts

The **Preparation of the Gifts** allows time for the preparation of our hearts. Like the Magi bearing gifts and doing homage to Majesty, we bring our gifts and our praise to the Table.

God has first blessed us with the gift of creation. Humans take those gifts given, wheat and grapes, and, using our creativity, make bread and wine. Then, we bring those gifts we have received and labored over to present them at the Altar/Table that they might be transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ. Finally, we receive them back in Communion. The procession of the **Gifts** says, in essence, "Behold the gifts God has given us!"

WHY IT MATTERS

We take great care preparing other festive tables for our most cherished gatherings. Could we do less for the table where the Real Presence of Christ will be made tangible for us?

From the General Instructions of the Roman Missal: The altar or Lord's table, which is the center of the whole Liturgy of the Eucharist, is made ready. . . . The offerings are then brought forward. It is a praiseworthy practice for the bread and wine to be presented by the faithful (73).

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

Is Epiphany about giving or getting gifts?

"We three kings of Orient are/ bearing gifts we traverse afar." Nowhere in the gospels does it claim there are three kings. They are magi, hereditary priests of the ancient Medes and Persians. At least the carol gets one thing right: this wise group does bear gifts. Gold symbolizes wealth and power. Frankincense, used in prayer, represents the divine Presence. Myrrh prepares bodies for burial. It's an ominous sign that would make a startling gift. . . . But they were appropriate honors for the King of the Universe, the Divine Son, and the crucified Lord.

We also bear Jesus gifts at every Eucharist: bread, wine, and our financial sacrifice. "Made by human hands," these gifts are transformed and returned to us as the Body and Blood of Christ, and then redistributed for those in need.

More gifts come to us by way of this shared Table. Grace pours out on the assembly. Grace forgives sin, and rescues us from every evil. This is one gift you don't want to put at the bottom of a closet.

The Epiphany of the Lord

A stranger in a foreign land, I was exhausted and homesick as my summer Spanish immersion ended in Guatemala. The rusty minivan arriving outside my small residence filled me with joyful hope. I was flying home to the U.S. and would be, at long last, completely happy. Or so I thought. After about half an hour of being home, I thought to myself, "This place is boring. I want to go somewhere." So, I hopped in my car and left to see my friends. As I drove, I wistfully wondered, "Where am I truly at home?"

The feast of Epiphany has a lot to do with our notion of home. Where is our origin? Where are we going? When is our wandering done? Saint Matthew tells us of the Magi, "They were overjoyed at seeing the star." This star will bring them home, to a place where their questing will end, and they will be satisfied. Their real home is neither in the East nor in the earthly Jerusalem. Somehow, their home is wherever this boy and his parents are.

If you're a teenager or older, you probably know by now that every physical home we have is temporary. So, we look up at the countless stars in our proverbial skies: things which dazzle and beckon us to follow toward peace. The Gospel invites us to behold that — at long last — God has sent us a star to follow home, one that whispers, "Follow me! I will take you home!" Perhaps that star is your spouse. A friend. An opportunity. A cause. An intuition about a new direction. A prayer group. What is it for you? How will you know? It will lead you to Mary and Joseph and their son, and you will be home.

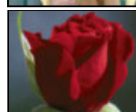

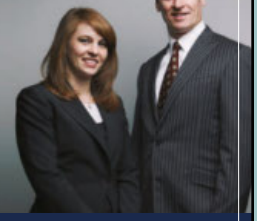

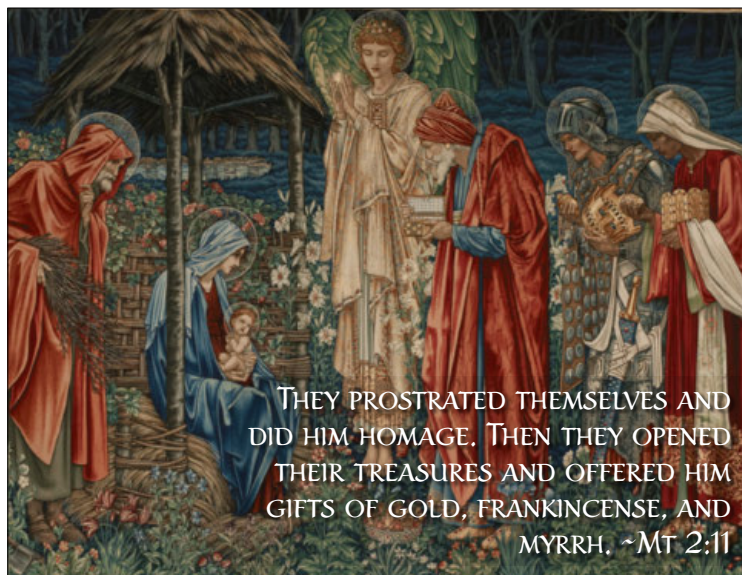
