IT'S CATHOLIC SCHOOLS WEEK!



WHAT IS NATIONAL CATHOLIC SCHOOLS WEEK?

Since 1974, National Catholic Schools Week is the annual celebration of Catholic education in the United States. It starts the last Sunday in January and runs all week, which in 2024 is January 28 – February 3. The theme for National Catholic Schools Week 2024 is "Catholic Schools: United in Faith and Community." Schools typically observe the annual celebration week with Masses, open houses and other activities for students, families, parishioners and community members. Through these events, schools focus on the value Catholic education provides to young people and its contributions to our church, our communities and our nation.

The first Catholic school that opened in the United State was called St. Mary's School in Philadelphia, in 1783. After some time, the enthusiasm and curiosity for Catholic education grew and the nation noticed a massive inflow of Catholics from all over the world. By the 1920s, more than 6,000 Catholic elementary schools accepted and enrolled almost two million students and employed 42,000

teachers. By the latter half of that century, enrollment grew, even more, reaching double the number of students. Ever since Catholic schools have been widely perceived and established as a viable means of education.

THE LIES THAT MAKE MURDERING OUR FUTURE PALPABLE.

It's been over a year since the Supreme Court overturned Roe v. Wade - and Illinois has become a legal 'safe haven' for the unborn to lose their lives. In 2022, over 5,800 out-ofstate residents traveled to Illinois for abortions from 40 states. This is a 9% increase in loss of life since 2021.

How did we get to a place where the killing of an inconvenient life is acceptable? Or accept human life disappearing as if they never were there to begin with souls with no birthdays, graves, or even names. We all know reasonable people who are pro-choice and truly do not believe innocent human life is being intentionally killed. If they did, they would think it was horrifying and wrong. On top of that, the reasons women have to abort their children are very real and valid to them.

One way is to try to have better conversations and show that although the path is narrow, it is possible. And we should at least *try* to walk it knowing that no mattler what, our families, friends and all of heaven accompany us. And show the love they will feel from their baby far outweighs the burden they think will destroy them. Here are just a few pro-choice arguments where we can maybe plant a seed for God to water:

Obviously life begins at birth. That's why we celebrate birthdays, not conception days, and why we don't have funerals following miscarriages.

- Our recognition of birthdays is cultural, not scientific.
- There is nothing about birth that makes a baby essentially different than he was before birth.

The unborn is an embryo or a fetus-just a simple blob of tissue, a product of conception-not a baby. Abortion is terminating a pregnancy, not killing a child.

- Prior to the first trimester, the unborn already has every body part she will ever have.
- Every abortion stops a beating heart and terminates measurable brain waves.
- Even in the earliest surgical abortions, the unborn child is clearly human in appearance.

Every woman should have control over her own body. Reproductive freedom is a basic right.

 Not all things done with a person's body are right, nor should they all be legally protected.

If Abortion is made illegal, tens of thousands of women will again die from back-alley and clotheshanger abortions.

- For decades prior to its legalization, 90 percent of abortions were done by physicians in their offices, not in back alleys.
- It is not true that tens of thousands of women died from illegal abortions before abortion was legalized.
- The history of abortion in Poland invalidates claims that making abortion illegal brings harm to women.
- Women still die from legal abortions in America.

Abortion is an issue where there is no middle ground. And if we are pro-choice, the sobering truth is that our choice is to advocate for abortion instead of oppose it. Our Lord said in Matthew 12:20, *He that is not with me, is against me.* Salvation of souls is the primary goal that should matter to us as Catholics and Hell is real and not empty.

St. Leonard de Port Maurice in his sermon on the Fewness of Those Saved says St. Vincent Ferrer told the story of an archdeacon in Lyons who died the same day and hour as Saint Bernard. After his death, he appeared to his Bishop: **"Know, Monsignor, that at the very hour I passed away, thirty-three thousand people also died. Out of this number, Bernard and myself went up to Heaven without delay, three went to Purgatory, and all the others fell into Hell."** And Mary showed the children of Fatima a vision of Hell which the children described as a sea of fire amid groans of despair.

Abortion is a spiritual battle more than a secular one. It's not what we think about any moral truth that matters, but what God thinks about it. He and His Holy Church have given us that insight: **Willful murder (abortion) is one of the four sins that cry out to heaven for vengance.** Let's review these lies we hear concerning the murder of our future generations, and encourage our children, family and each other to think like God does - and begin to speak the truth. Where God is, love abounds.

KATHY O'NEILL, R.N. 👽 COORDINATOR OF PASTORAL HEALTHCARE Is it Risky to Take Expired Medication?

When was the last time you cleaned out your medicine cabinet? According to a Consumer Reports study, approximately one-third of Americans haven't cleaned out their medicine cabinet in the past year and almost one-fifth haven't done so in the past three years.

If you haven't recently inventoried your medications, you most likely have expired prescriptions mixed in with your current ones. It might seem like no big deal, but there are dangers associated with storing and taking expired medications.

"For your safety, expired medications should not be taken" says Dr. Ruchi Parikh, a family medicine physician with Advocate Health Care. "Every medication is different and there is no way to know by looking at an expired medication what will happen if you take it. It may not only be ineffective, but your body could have a minor or serious reaction to it."



Dr. Parikh recommends cleaning your medicine cabinet monthly and she has a few tips for tackling this chore:

- 1. Take inventory. Collect all medications from around your house to review them at once. This will ensure no medications are forgotten about or stored incorrectly.
- 2. Review expiration dates and check condition. Remove all medications that are expired and place them in a bag labeled for disposal. Also, verify that all current medications are in good condition. Medications that aren't properly sealed or have been stored in extreme cold or heat may be discolored, stuck together, or have an odor discard these along with the expired ones. Medications that are unlabeled should also be placed in the disposal bag.
- **3.** Dispose of expired medication safely. Don't toss your medications in the trash or flush them down the toilet. Dispose all medications at an authorized drug collection site, which includes many pharmacies. Remember to remove your personal information from the packaging before disposal.
- **4. Properly store your current medication**. Once you've finished going through your cabinet, safely store your current medication. This should be in a temperature-controlled location that is out of reach of children and pets.

Caring for your medicine cabinet will help keep you and your family safe. But if you do accidentally take an expired medication, don't panic. "Call your doctor. They will be able to provide specific information about the medication and can recommend what reactions to monitor for," explains Dr. Parikh.

Benedictus \be-nə-'dik-təs\

From Latin meaning "blessed," the hymn sung by Zechariah, John the Baptist's father, an elder priest, who became mute on learning that he and Elizabeth would become parents late in life. After John's birth, Zechariah's tongue is loosed and he praises God with this canticle beginning: "Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel, for he has come to his people and set them free" (Luke 1:68).

CONTEXT

Since the early centuries, the **Benedictus** has been sung in the morning prayer of the church's liturgy because of its praise for the coming of the Redeemer and its allusion to Christ coming as the dawn to give light to those in darkness. *—Stephen J. Binz*

May I have the courage today/ To live the life that I would love,/ To postpone my dream no longer,/ But do at last what I came here for/ And waste my heart on fear no more. —John O'Donohue, **Benedictus**: A Book of Blessings

WHY IT MATTERS

The **Benedictus** is one of four canticles sung at the start of Luke's gospel, including Mary's Magnificat, (*My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord*), the song of the angels to the shepherds (*Glory to God in the highest!*), and Simeon's prayer at the presentation of Jesus in the temple (*Lord, now you let your servant go in peace*). Together these songs remind us that, in the face of good news, the most reasonable response is to sing. Joyful people know this. It is the most natural response to the graciousness of God who truly has "come to the people and set them free"!

From The General Instruction on the Liturgy of the Hours: The Gospel canticles, the *Benedictus*, the *Magnificat* and the *Nunc dimittis*, should be accorded the same solemnity and dignity as is usual for the hearing of the Gospel (138).

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

Why do we sing at Mass?

Saint Augustine, who said many things well, insisted: "Singing is for one who loves." This is the same Bishop Augustine who considered banning music from his church altogether. In the end he adhered to an older proverb: "Whoever sings well prays twice over." So pass out the song sheets.

Saint Paul was an earlier proponent of church music, back when church still gathered in somebody's house. He advocated that believers sing "psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God" (Col. 3:16). While Augustine got it right that singing is for lovers, happy people in general whistle while they work, and grateful people know they have something to sing about. This may explain why some folks in church are reluctant to sing. Without a significant increase in the spirit of joy and gratitude, don't expect an increase in responsive singers. Yet to those who love, feel joy, and are grateful, a little frivolity in public is in order.

GOSPEL MEDITATION:

January 28, 2024 4th Sunday in Ordinary Time

I love movies about exorcisms. Apparently, so do many others. The 2023 movie "Nefarious" features a possibly possessed inmate on death row. Critics were not impressed, but audiences scored it at 97% on the website Rotten Tomatoes. Most people have an appreciation for the demonic realm, even if cultural elites are generally embarrassed about it. As is standard in exorcism movies, the afflicted person (in this case, a man named Edward Brady) thinks and acts like *multiple* persons. He is someone besides himself. We know what that is like. We feel *fake* sometimes, not ourselves.

The same dynamic is on dramatic display this week in the Gospel. Jesus the Exorcist approaches a possessed man who utters, **"What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth?"** Notice the plural, us. The basic effect of the demonic is division. The man's identity is fractured, divided, and thus many. Jesus powerfully expels the spirit by saying, **"Quiet! Come out of him!"** Jesus' word has the power to restore the man's singularity — *him* — and indeed it does.

All this helps us to dismiss childish images of demons sporting red goat tails. Equally, it overcomes the cultured aloofness that dreams demons are mere metaphors for evil. We see instead that fallen angels are conscious and intelligent beings who orient their agency toward division. They bring about schism where there should be unity, e.g., in persons, families, communities, politics, and so on. Thankfully, Jesus commands demons to flee from all these places to restore wholeness and peace. What if we made room for his word where we need it?
