# **Lenten Reflection**

everyone had turned from God.

First Sunday of Lent

In the first reading this Sunday, God tells Noah of God's covenant that he will never again destroy the world by flood. God made the rainbow in the sky as symbol to remind us of this promise. Earlier God had destroyed almost everything because of great sin and corruption. Almost

God had destroyed all but those few who had escaped on the Ark. People had turned away from him. God covenants how he will act in the future. This is remarkable. God is not saying you will be safe if everyone is good. Rather, he is saying that there will not be a general punishment by flood

even if everyone or almost everyone is bad.

Sometimes we confuse the word *covenant* with *contract*. In some cultures, and in some contexts, a covenant may be like a contract. But in Jewish and Roman Catholic tradition the two words are quite different, and we are blessed by what God promises us.

We abuse God's covenantal promise if we act as if this is a one-sided contract which does not require anything of us. If we assume free will permits us to do anything, if we act as if there is no sin and if we assume that there is no one in hell and no punishment, then we miss the point of the covenantal relationship that God is offering.

God will reveal his full covenant over time: Abraham will be the father of great nations, from David will spring a king who reigns forever. Eventually the covenant is fully revealed in Jesus, the Christ. The covenant is fulfilled in Jesus because God offers us mercy and love if we are repentant for our sins.

God is a constant. Everything he says and every act is a constant; "I am who am," as he later reveals to Moses. Eventually Moses and the people will be freed from slavery by the flood that destroys Pharaoh's pursuing army. If we follow the *contract* model instead of the *covenant* model we do not have to do anything; that may sufficient if all we are trying to do is to avoid drowning in the flood. But if we want to be cleansed in the waters of Baptism and receive God's love and mercy, we must repent.

# **Lenten Regulations for Fasting and Abstinence**

Abstinence from meat is to be observed by all Catholics 14 years old and older on **Ash Wednesday** and on all **Fridays** of Lent.

Fasting is to be observed on **Ash Wednesday** and on **Good Friday** by all Catholics who are 18 years of age but not yet 60.

Those who are bound by this may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted.

### Our Valentine To God

This year, St. Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday are celebrated on the same day. At first, I thought what a strange coincidence. Then, I thought that it seemed very appropriate. **Love** is the main theme of St. Valentine's Day – and God is **True Love**.

As we give gifts of love to our family and friends, what then can we give to God? Everything that we have comes from God. **God is love**. We show our love for God by the way we use the gifts that He has given us. Our *thanks* start with our presence at Mass to share in His Eucharist banquet.

We thank God in a special way when we share what we have with others. How do we do that? We gain some insight from the Letter of James (James 2:14) "What good is it if someone says he has faith but does not have good works? Faith without (good) works is dead."

How do we know where to direct our works? Here are some thoughts. What does love look like? It has the hands to help others. ... It has eyes to see misery and want. It has the ears to hear the people's sighs and sorrows. That is what love looks like.

We have already started our Lenten journey; how should we proceed? Our gospel readings are a good place to start.

In the Ash Wednesday gospel, Jesus starts us off in the right direction as He says: "Take care not to perform righteous deeds in order that people may see them, otherwise you will have no recompense from your heavenly Father." In other words, Do our prayer and good works for love of God – not for love of self.

In today's gospel Jesus proclaims the message of God as He ministers to the people. How are we called to proclaim the message of God (in prayer and deed) in our world? By our actions. In addition to our Mass schedule, OLW provides **Stations of the Cross** (every Friday during Lent at 7 pm, preceded by soup at 6 pm in the Gathering Place); **Recitation of the Rosary** (at 8 am prior to 8:30 daily Mass, and at 11 am on Sundays, preceding the 11:30 Mass); **Adoration of** 

the Blessed Sacrament (on Saturdays at 4 pm, preceding 5 pm Mass); and Multi-parish Reconciliation Services (from Monday, March 18 through Thursday, March 21); to name a few.

We show our love for others through our sharing ministries with *Our Lady of Unity*; *Faith into Action*; and the many wonderful ministries offered through *Knights of Columbus* and *St. Vincent DePaul*. All these and more are listed in our bulletin and on our website.

"We've started our Forty Day journey that concludes on Easter Sunday, but our Faith Journey continues for the rest of our life."

The challenge for all of us is to make our changes permanent, not a mere forty day detour. What can we do to make the changes last? Each day brings new challenges and opportunities – we need to make those changes a part of our "memory bank."

As a starting point, I reflected on Robert Frost's poem – *The Road not taken...* 

The first two lines are;
Two roads diverged in a yellow wood
And sorry I could not travel both

And the last two are:
I took the one less traveled by,
And that has made all the difference.

What Frost is saying is that each day will bring different choices for us. Our challenge is to make the right choice – and to make it last. If we're able to make these changes and make them a part of our daily life, I'm sure God will be very pleased with our "Valentine" to Him.

Top of the list – **Thank you** to all who generously supported OLW during the past year. Our Sunday collections were up 7% over 2022. Second, we benefited from an 8.7% increase for the last quarter of the year vs the same period in 2022. We thank you.

# Moving forward -

- The contract for the second-floor windows in the rectory is signed, a deposit paid and the measurements have been sent to the manufacturer.
- We have chosen an Architect and a Contractor for the updating of the Middle school bathrooms. Keep in mind, this work will mean the middle school will be off limits from June 17 to August 3, while the work is being performed.
- Final bids for the new Front Doors of the Church are pending. We hope to issue this contract in the next 30 days.
- We are currently reviewing a bid to change all exterior campus lighting to LED to enhance our nighttime visibility and safety. ComEd is offering very attractive incentives that make this possible.
- The facilitators/leaders who gave us the great Celebrate 70 parties have agreed to help plan and execute this year's parish activities: Parish Picnic, Golf Outing and of course our own Polish Oktoberfest! (You don't get that in Munich.) If you would like to be a part of any of those committees feel free to email me or watch the coming bulletins and Wayside Wednesdays for sign-up details.

As we enter the season of Lent, I hope you will avail yourself to the many opportunities to celebrate this special time in our liturgical year:

- Ashes on Ash Wednesday
- Eucharistic Adoration; 40 hours 2/14-2/17 and all five Saturdays of Lent
- Stations of the Cross & Soup supper, each Friday, led by the lay people of the parish.
- Tuesdays Together, Mass, Adoration and Confessions
- Rosary; Monday Saturday @ 8:00 AM and before the 11:30 mass
- Eucharistic Miracles Exhibit, March 2-5th in the Gym

Finally, Lent is a time of **Almsgiving**. While our collections increased in 2023, we are far from where we were *pre-Covid*. I ask you to prayerfully consider increasing your weekly giving by the amount you may have spent on the <u>things you are offering up for Lent</u>. # THE EUCHARISTIC MIRACLES OF THE WORLD

Our Lady of the Wayside — Fr. Mackin Center, March 2–5 and **SPEAKER MICHAEL O'NEILL**, March 5



The Eucharistic Miracles of the World is coming to Our Lady of the Wayside and can be seen in the Fr. Mackin Center from March 2 through March 5. The exhibit is a well-documented presentation of Eucharistic miracles that have taken place throughout the ages in various countries around the world. They are recognized by the Catholic Church as truly worthy of belief. The exhibit was created by Blessed Carlo Acutis, a 15-year-old Roman Catholic from Milan, Italy, who was beatified on October 10, 2020. It was his desire for the exhibit to draw others to love the Blessed Sacrament. The exhibit is

comprised of poster-size panels, each featuring a Eucharistic miracle with historic documentation, photos and illustrations. By means of the these panels, one can "virtually visit" places where the miracles took place.



**Michael O'Neill**, author, EWTN host, and creator of the popular miracle hunting website MiracleHunter.com, will talk about the Eucharistic Miracles on Tuesday, March 5 in the Church. He will show a 20 minute video during his presentation that he produced for EWTN. This will take place at 1 pm in the afternoon and then again at 7 pm, following the 6 pm evening Mass. There will be a book signing in the Gathering Space adjacent to the Church, after both of Mr. O'Neil's presentations. Books may be purchased with cash or a check.



# **Should You Donate Blood?**



You might be considering giving blood, whether you are a first-time donor or a regular lifesaver. Dr. Ajay Sahajpal, a transplant surgeon and executive medical director of the Global and Executive Health Program at Advocate Health Care and Aurora Health Care, shares five reasons why you should donate blood now — and throughout the year.

# 1. To help save lives

Your donation can help save up to three lives. A small sacrifice of your time makes a true difference for a child needing a transfusion to help them through their cancer journey, or a young woman after a car accident or the many others facing life-threatening situations.

### 2. In honor of a loved one

Perhaps a friend or family member received units of blood during an illness, providing healing or extra time to make more memories. Please support the Emily Holum Memorial Blood Drive. Refer to the flyer in this bulletin for all the details.

# 3. To give back or pay it forward

Perhaps you have or will need blood in the future for your own healing.

# 4. To continually replenish inventory

Did you know that most blood products last only 42 days (about 1 and a half months), with some lasting as few as five days? That's why blood centers can't accumulate vast reserves of donations, and there's no "factory" where we can manufacture blood.

# 5. For a fully gratifying feeling

Dr. Sahajpal says many people feel a great sense of fulfillment in helping others by giving blood and often are repeat donors. A healthy person can give blood every eight weeks.

# So, who can give blood?

- You can donate blood if you:
- Are in good health and feel well
- Are at least 16 years or older, in most states
- Weigh at least 110 pounds
- Have not donated blood in the last eight weeks

Reasons you might not be able to donate:

- You have a cold or the flu
- You have low iron levels
- You are on certain medications
- You recently traveled outside of the country

# **WHY IT MATTERS**

Since the first century, the bishop of the local church in Rome has been understood to possess the "Chair of Peter," which endows great authority and carries the role of special keeper of the church's mission.

The power of the **papacy** stems from Jesus' choice to set Peter in authority over the rest: "You are Peter and upon this rock I will build my church." (Matthew 16:18). Papal primacy and the role of the pope as Vicar of Christ and pastor of the whole Church, with "full, supreme and universal power over the Church" was confirmed at numerous ecumenical councils, including Vatican II (*Lumen gentium*, 22).

# **QUESTION OF THE WEEK**

# What are the qualifications for being pope?

The vast majority of popes were ordained. Priesthood is a plus, topped off with a hearty Roman education at a pontifical institute. Doing time in highly visible chanceries in large cities increases your chances. Attaining the status of bishop and cardinal tremendously increases your odds even though neither position is canonically required.

Medieval and renaissance popes had the advantages of coming from princely or aristocratic Roman families, but never mind if you don't have a fine pedigree. Sixtus V was the son of a laundress, and Pius X the child of a seamstress. A few popes were renowned preachers like the Franciscan Sixtus IV, and others were lawyers, professors, and poets. But just as many had their beginnings as monks, anchorites, and even a hermit (Celestine V, but he abdicated to return to his hermitage after six months).

Though being extraordinarily wicked hasn't always been a deal-breaker, more than a few popes were martyred or popularly acclaimed as saints. Holiness is a great asset. Wanting to be pope probably isn't.

# **GOSPEL MEDITATION:**

# February 18, 2024 1st Sunday of Lent

When I feel down, I sometimes watch the famous "Double Rainbow" video on YouTube to feel better. It's hilarious. A young man camping in Yosemite Park sees two rainbows stretching across the sky. He bursts into a kind of ecstasy. "Double rainbow, all the way! Oh my God!" he announces. Then he starts to weep. He cries out, "What does it *mean*?" Beneath the humor of his glorious overreaction is the deep intuition we all have, I think, when we see the colorful bow in the sky. This Sunday, God sends a rainbow to Noah, and to us. What *does* it mean?

Long before YouTube had the double rainbow, Dante's medieval poem *The Divine Comedy* featured one in his image of paradise. Seeing two rainbows, he muses that one is born of the other. The bow is God's promise of peace. For Dante, it's even more: nature's encrypted image of the Trinitarian God. One visible rainbow (God the Son) is begotten of another usually invisible one (God the Father) united by invisible light between them (God the Spirit). Like invisible light, Trinitarian glory surrounds us in every moment — but Jesus has made it visible in his glorious body.

Lenten challenge: This might seem silly, but this Lent I invite you to find a rainbow and meditate on it. You might have to make one yourself, like this current desert-dweller will. Gaze on it. See there a natural gift from the Creator, saying to you, "Here I am! I will love and protect you, surrounding you in My glory." This Lent let's embrace that with confidence, rain, or shine.


