Fifth Sunday of Lent

There is a confluence of topics to discuss this weekend; Confirmation of some 72 of our young people, (wasn't 72 the number who received the Spirit in Scripture?) the Fifth Sunday of Lent, St. Patrick's Day and, this coming Tuesday, the Solemnity St. Joseph.

Congratulations to, and please pray for, the young people who were confirmed this Saturday. Confirmation is their first commitment as adult Catholic Christians. Confirmation is the first commitment these young people are making, on their own, to follow Christ and to grow more closely to him. These young folks make us optimistic about the future of the Church; their faith, the thought they put into in choosing their saints' names and the joy from helping others during their service hours are all signs of a wonderful and growing faith. Receiving the gifts of the Holy Spirit in confirmation will provide these young men and women with a powerful mystical start as adult Catholics. St. Joseph is your guide, he listened to God's spirit.

It might seem strange to adopt St. Patrick as the theme for the remainder of this discourse, but then I am mostly of an Irish background, so please excuse my bias. St. Patrick was not Irish, but rather, he had been enslaved by Irish pirates and sold as a slave. He spent his teen years on a mountainside as a slave shepherd. He had no shelter from the cold and the rain and no companionship but for massive Irish wolfhounds to protect the flock from predators. On a clear starry night, in a mystical way, he was moved by God's presence. He risked his life to escape. He risked his life to return, to bring the Gospel to these strange pagans. God used this young man who had suffered as a slave to convert these people. Within decades God would use the Irish to bring the faith back to the European mainland after the fall of Rome.

In the book, "How the Irish Saved Civilization" the author goes through the mystery of this whole event without explicitly acknowledging God's hand. But in the conclusion of the book the author wonders whether civilization will next be saved by someone from East Africa or India.

It would be the way God works.






"THE PASSION OF CHRIST" MOVES OUR YOUTH








CFM Families, Soup and Stations


Do You Snack More Than You Eat Meals?

We like to snack. No doubt about it. Americans crave and indulge in snacks daily. In fact, we unknowingly make more than two hundred food-related decisions each day – and snacking has been found to play a substantial portion.

A recently published study revealed snacks contribute considerably to dietary intakes of adults in the U.S. Researchers analyzed data from more than 23,000 adults who participated in a survey and were asked to recall what and when they ate during a 24-hour period. The results showed snacks account for about 20% or more of an adult's daily food intake, contributing to a meal's worth of calories. Analysis also indicated snacks contributed very little nutritional value to the overall diet.

"Unlike our meals, we often don't give much thought to what we snack on," says Clayton Keene, a nurse practitioner at Aurora Health Care. "Usually, the snacks we eat are easy and convenient, which can mean foods that are processed and high in fat, sugar and calories."

But there's good news, Keene says. Snacking can be healthy – if you plan ahead and make healthier choices.



- 1. Plan ahead, make a grocery list and buy healthier snacks. If you don't bring junk food into your house, it won't be there to tempt you.
- 2. Make your own granola bars and energy bites. This allows you to control the amount of sugar and add healthy ingredients, like flaxseed and unsweetened craisins.
- 3. Watch your portions and aim for about 150-250 calories per snack. It should satisfy but not add too many calories or interfere with your regular meals.
- 4. For packaged snacks, always check the nutrition label. The number of calories, sugar and fat can be surprising.
- 5. Try to avoid snacking while watching TV, scrolling through social media or doing other things. Stop and savor the snack.
- 6. Carry healthy snacks when you're out and about. Having something handy that's healthier when you get a craving or become hungry is better than impulsively buying something on the go that can be less-than-good for you.

Simple, (nearly) guiltless snack ideas

- Berries, apple, banana or other fresh fruit
- Craisins, raisins or other unsweetened dried fruit
- Smoothie made with fresh fruit and greens
- Low-fat cottage cheese or yogurt
- Cheese, canned tuna or salmon with whole-grain crackers
- Whole grain toast with avocado or peanut butter
- Hummus with baby carrots and celery sticks
- Cut up bell pepper, cucumber, cauliflower or other fresh veggies
- Unsalted nuts and seeds
- Popcorn that is air-popped or made with vegetable oil
- Plain or sparkling water with lemon, cucumber slices, mint or other herbs added
- Fat-free or low-fat dairy milk, plain soy milk, or unsweetened oat or nut milk
- Unsweetened tea or coffee sprinkled with cinnamon, nutmeg or other spices

WHY IT MATTERS

Our present culture too often celebrates the vulgar, the cynical, and the rude. **Veneration** is an exercise in humility as it honors those holy ones whose virtues invite us to reach higher, whose lives are signs of faithfulness and hope.

From the Catechism of the Catholic Church: The Christian **veneration** of images is not contrary to the first Commandment which proscribes idols. Indeed, whoever **venerates** an image **venerates** the person portrayed in it. . . . Images [lead] us to God incarnate (2132).

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

What do we know about Saint Joseph?

In terms of facts, almost nothing. Matthew alone highlights Joseph's role. Here we meet Joseph the dreamer who, like his namesake in Genesis, learns of heaven's purposes while he sleeps. The earliest gospel calls the adult Jesus "son of Mary" rather than "son of Joseph." Luke and John prefer to call Jesus "son of Joseph." However, Luke adds, "as was thought." Joseph's last appearance is when Jesus is 12. Jesus is called the carpenter's son, revealing his father's occupation. Tradition says Joseph died when Jesus was 18 with the art of the Eastern Church depicting the death of Joseph.

Matthew describes Joseph as a righteous man who considers divorcing his pregnant betrothed. Then heaven intervenes. Joseph takes Mary home and gives her his full protection. It's an enormous concession to the divine will, especially crediting Mary's perpetual virginity. We always want more from Joseph. He's already given quite a lot.

GOSPEL MEDITATION:

March 17, 2024 5th Sunday of Lent

A middle-aged woman sat on the couch in my parish office and recounted to me a shocking list of terrible calamities in her life: addictions, terminal illnesses, financial loss, broken relationships, and so on. She smiled as she did so. "Please forgive me," I asked, "but you seem to be smiling as you share this." She said, "Father John, I am totally overwhelmed. But I'm smiling because I just can't wait to see what good things God does with this mess." She expected God would manifest His glory when she most needed it.

This week in the Gospel, God speaks from heaven for the third and final time in Jesus' earthly ministry. It's at a tough moment. Gentiles seek Jesus, who announces his terrible suffering, and then boldly prays, "Father, glorify your name!" John then writes: Then a voice came from heaven, "I have glorified it and will glorify it again." Was the task of drawing the whole non-Jewish world to himself overwhelming? Or was it the terrible specter of crucifixion? Whatever it was, the crushing weight triggers his turning to the Father with an unshakeable expectation of divine glory to burst through. And indeed, it did on Easter Sunday. In our burdens, our greatest strength is to turn to God and boldly ask Him for His glory.

Lenten challenge: This week, I invite you to list out everything which is a burden to you. Write it down. Then add these words: "Father, glorify Your name in all these things!" Put that paper in your pocket or purse when you come to Holy Week liturgies next week. You might smile at the most unlikely times.


