



EASTER SUNDAY Reflection

The Resurrection of the Lord



Starting with the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Thursday, this is the busiest liturgical 72 hours of the year. It brings our focus to the gift of Salvation, the cost of the gift of Salvation and the promised reward of Salvation.

Consider Jesus who instituted the Eucharist at the Last Supper. Holy Thursday was the first Lord's Supper. Jesus was fully aware that his disciples would abandon him, one would deny him, and one would betray him. He was fully aware of how he would die, the humiliation, the scorn and the pain. Was he cynical on Thursday? No. No matter which Gospel account of the Last Supper you read, Jesus was instructing, and led by example. He provided us with the Eucharist! He used bread and wine as the "accidents" of the substance of his body and blood. He meant to be fully accessible to everyone. Clearly, he is divine. No one who is only human would have prepared those whom he knew would abandon and deny him for their future success.

Did the Father require the pain and suffering? No, he demanded obedience. The sacrifice was complete obedience to the Father's will. We, the guilty, required the pain and suffering. Jesus's effort was to get across the model he meant us to follow. Some clever folks ask questions such as could God have caused salvation by snapping his fingers? Of course. He is God and has infinite power. The more important question is would we have recognized how dear Salvation is if Jesus had done anything less than what he did on Good Friday?

Holy Saturday is a time for introspection. No Mass is allowed on Holy Saturday. The pause that is Holy Saturday reminds us of the anxiety the sense of loss that is the period between Christ's death on the Cross and the Resurrection.

The joy, the sense of mystery and even Thomas's doubt are all part of the normal range of human emotion when one is confronted by an unexpected miracle. Then one has an inkling that the Resurrection is a promise of Salvation and everlasting life through Jesus --even though I failed.

Then on the Road to Emmaus, Jesus explains all that has happened and how it was anticipated in all of Scripture.

Christ is Risen! He is Risen indeed!

Happy Easter! I pray that you and your families are filled with the Joy of our risen Lord. After the gray and cold days of winter, Easter always delivers the promise that the Lord has risen, and spring is on our doorstep.

You may recall that we ended 2023 on a strong note regarding Sunday offerings. We were up approximately 8% for the last three months of that year.

Things have changed, and I am sorry to report that we have **lost that momentum**. As compared to 2023, we have experienced a 6% decrease year to date. If you have been monitoring Stewardship numbers in our bulletins, you may have noticed that we have averaged \$10,000 or more below our weekly budget. Sunday offerings are how we manage the business side of our parish. Like your own home expenses, we face a constant stream of increases.

In light of our current situation, I ask all OLW parishioners to prayerfully **consider increasing your weekly offerings by 10%** to help us turn this around. While this will not totally solve all our challenges, it will greatly help.







Simple At-Home Remedies for a Stuffy Nose

With respiratory infections such as cold, flu, COVID and RSV on the rise, you may be on the search for remedies that can help ease nasal congestion, also referred to as a stuffy nose.

"The most important tip of fighting cold and flu season begins with covering coughs and sneezes and practicing good hand hygiene," says Amber Schmitz, a nurse practitioner and a Aurora Health Care Quick Care Virtual Health teammate.

Schmitz shares that it's important to understand the difference between a viral infection versus a bacterial infection. Cold, flu and COVID are all viral illnesses that typically last 7-10 days (about 1 and a half weeks) and go away on their own. Antibiotics treat bacterial infections and cannot help with viral infections. However, at-home remedies can help ease the common symptoms of a runny or stuffy nose.

Schmitz gives the following tips for at-home nasal congestion relief:

- Drink lots of fluids. Staying hydrated helps to keep mucous thin and loose.
- Apply a warm, moist compress to your sinuses 4-6 times a day to help with sinus drainage.
- Use a sterile saline rinse three times a day or nasal saline spray.
- Try using a cool mist humidifier, which can help with dry air.
- Elevate your head while sleeping by propping up a few, comfortable pillows. This will prevent pooling of mucous in the sinus passage.



Adults may also follow these additional instructions:

- Drink warm tea with honey.
- Gargle saltwater or try throat lozenges for sore throat.
- Tips for over the counter medicines, or those medications that don't need a doctor's prescription may include:
- Take expectorants to thin mucus or phlegm, so it can become easier to blow, cough or spit the mucus.
- Use nasal spray in each nostril for nasal congestion.
- If needed, acetaminophen may be taken for fever or aches. Do not exceed 4,000mg in 24 hours.

Before taking any medication, consult with your doctor and thoroughly read and adhere to the label instructions. If you have questions or are unsure about the medication, contact your provider.

For those under 18 years of age, at-home remedies need to be adjusted to the following:

- Gargle saltwater if the child can follow instructions.
- Use mentholated rubs over the chest and front of neck. This can help soothe a cough.
- Throat lozenges may be given to children 4 years and older for a sore throat. It's important to follow the package instructions and thoroughly watch and remain present while the child consumes the lozenge.
- Nasal mucus suction devices can help younger children find relief.
- Honey may also help a cough. Do not give honey to babies under 1 year of age. Schmitz says to follow these recommendations: 1-5 years old:,½ teaspoon; 6-11 years old, 1 teaspoon; 12 years and older, 2 teaspoons of honey.

Consult with your child's pediatrician before giving any medication. It's important to note that you shouldn't give over-the-counter cough and cold medications to children under 6 years of age as these medications can have serious side effects. Schmitz encourages video visits for minor illnesses like cold, flu or sinus infections since they can be more convenient when you are under the weather.

"With telehealth, it's important to use common sense," says Schmitz. "If you think you're experiencing a medical emergency or having difficulty breathing, dial 911."

WORD OF THE WEEK

Octave \'äk-tiv\

From the Latin for "eighth," a group of eight; in music, the eighth note; in the liturgical year, an eight-day celebration of the highest-ranking feasts, or solemnities, of Christmas and Easter. The **Octave** of Easter is followed by the Easter season, which lasts 50 days and ends with the feast of Pentecost.

WHY IT MATTERS

Some feasts are so central to our Christian faith that a single day of celebration isn't adequate. The Incarnation of Jesus and his Resurrection are crucial to the story of our salvation. Both declare that, body and spirit together, humanity is significant to God and worthy of redemption in Christ. The Christmas and Easter **octaves** give us time to ponder the greatest mysteries and joys of our faith.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

Why is Easter Season so long?

The Easter Season is determined by the eight weeks it takes to get from the Resurrection to Pentecost. In Lent, we embrace penitential practices in anticipation of Jesus' Resurrection. What happens next is nothing less than the birth of the church. Easter itself is an **octave**, or eight-day feast. In liturgical practice, the **Octave** of Easter is like a week of Easters as we light the Paschal candle, sing the Gloria, and continue to contemplate the wonder that death has a door. Jesus passed through it, and so will we. Is a week too long to ponder this?

After Easter, Jesus continues to appear, teaching them more about God's kingdom for 40 days, a sacred number symbolizing completeness. Then Jesus returns to his Father in the Ascension. The disciples devote themselves to prayer from that hour until Pentecost, when the Spirit comes and the church is launched into prime time. What should we be doing from Easter through Pentecost? Imitating the disciples: celebrating, contemplating, learning, and praying to prepare for the mission ahead.

Easter Sunday, The Resurrection of the Lord

Outside Chicago, there is a small cemetery in the woods behind Mundelein Seminary, where I was a student. One night I was exploring it. I looked up and was shocked to see an imposing seventeen-foot angel towering over me and preparing to blow a trumpet. Adrenaline rushed through me. I gasped and uttered, "Oh my God!" Quickly I realized it was in fact a massive bronze statue. I tried to calm myself down. But it still freaked me out.

As we begin to celebrate Easter today, this image might seem a bit unnerving. But please recall that for the first disciples on the morning of the resurrection, it was precisely that. It wasn't joyful at first, it was terrifying. It wasn't peaceful, it was unsettling. In that Jerusalem cemetery, something otherworldly had happened. Angels announced that he was no longer dead, but alive. They had blown their trumpets, so to speak, and Jesus had risen. Soon the disciples' shock in that dark cemetery would turn into joy.

We all have our own places of the dead, too, don't we? Deceased loved ones. Our tired patterns of blame. Relationships stuck in resentment. Indifference to the poor. Lost dreams. Despair about our future. Fear of sickness and death. These are our "cemeteries" where we don't expect much to happen. Today we enter — if we dare — those places with the disciples. See the mighty angel standing there, trumpet ready to blare!
