The Good Shepherd and the Wolf

I remember very clearly the first movie I watched during my pregnancy with my eldest child. In this film, there is a scene where a young boy is kidnapped and shoved into the back of a van guarded by vicious dogs. His mother persists in trying to free him, even

as the dogs snap at her. Their bared teeth and full-throated snarls don't slow her efforts in the slightest.

It wasn't a great movie or even a particularly great scene, but I'll never forget this scene. I'll never forget those dogs.

I had just learned that I was a mother a few days ago. The life growing deep within seemed to me as frail as a whispered secret, but I loved it powerfully. I worried constantly if the baby was safe and healthy. I agonized over signs — real or imagined — that could tell me if the poppyseed-sized child was thriving or failing.

I understood, for the first time in my life, why a woman would charge a pack of attack dogs without hesitation not because she should, but because she has to.

She could choose not to fight, certainly. She could walk away. But why would she? A future without her son is so much more painful than any physical wound. She may fear for her life, but she fears a life without her child so much more.

The Good Shepherd discourse reveals to us the motivation behind God's actions throughout all of salvation history. From Adam to Noah to Abraham, all the way down to the time of the Messiah and beyond, He keeps trying to get us back. He keeps braving the attack dogs, time after time. He never stops. He never grows weary. And it baffles us: what's in it for Him? we wonder, because we are quicker to give up on ourselves than He is. Why does He keep trying?

He could choose not to fight, sure. But why would He? He doesn't want a future without us.



Dear OLW Community,

My name is Gillian Heyden and my family members have been active parishioners at Our Lady of the Wayside since 1999. I attended school here, made all of my sacraments, was an altar server, sung at mass and served in multiple capacities for 13 years at VBS. All of these experiences have contributed to the respect I have for catholic social teaching and my pursuit of a doctorate in occupational therapy at Elizabethtown College.

I am especially passionate about projects that will support children. I've learned how important daily tasks are to an individual's health and meaningful participation in life. It is desolating when a person is unable to complete tasks due to lack of support. Often, these deficiencies are particularly evident in children with special needs and orphans. It is hard to fathom just how alone these children must feel, 'othered' and outcasted by their society, and without the necessary resources for fruitful development. As we learn from the Psalms, we are called to *"Defend the cause of the weak and fatherless; maintain the rights of the poor and oppressed."* (Psalm 82:3) Where better to learn how to do these than where resources are lacking the most?



This coming May, members of my class through Elizabethtown College have the unique opportunity to serve orphaned children and children with special needs in Vietnam. Through our service trip, facilitated through Brittany's Hope, a group of fellow students, faculty, and volunteers will travel to Vietnam to provide support to several orphanages through various projects. These children will greatly benefit through the provision of physical resources as well as compassion and emotional support. This trip will accomplish the divine imperative referenced at the beginning of my letter and allow these children to live with the freedom and dignity they deserve.

That's why we need your help and support. We intend to improve the lives of these children through different projects that we are currently designing. Our goal is to meet the specific needs that their caregivers have relayed to us, including providing adaptive equipment and therapeutic interventions that will allow them to be independent in

the activities of daily living.



Peace of mind. It is not always easy to come by in today's fast-paced, technologically advanced world. Marie Mauter, a licensed clinical social worker and an employee assistance program counselor at Advocate Good Shepherd Hospital in Barrington, Ill., offers seven tips to help manage the stressors in your life:

Set limits on smartphone usage

Electronics are a big challenge to managing our peace of mind. They can distract us and often have us feeling that we are supposed to be connected "24-7." It is very important to set limits on smartphone usage, including checking various social media sites, emails

and text messages. When possible, try limiting usage to set times throughout the day, and make sure you set aside specific times when they are off-limits, whether at the dinner table or during "family time."

Keep electronics out of the bedroom

Keep electronic use out of the bedroom at night or when it is close to bedtime. This will help lessen the impact of the light from the phone on melatonin production. Not enough melatonin can negatively affect sleep patterns.

Try to enforce self-care rituals every day.

When we get busy, we sometimes put our needs on the back burner. This can lead to pent up anxiety and leave us stressed and feeling unsatisfied. Try to stick to healthy routines as much as possible including eating healthy, exercising regularly and getting consistent sleep.

Be aware of negative messages you may be giving yourself.

We cannot always change situations, but we can have an impact on our reactions to them.

Don't be a perfectionist.

Try not to be hard on yourself when mistakes are made. After all, we are human.

Reach out for support from positive people in your life.

Sometimes we tend to isolate ourselves when we are busy or going through a difficult time. Being around positive people can bring positive energy to any situation.

Try to accept and embrace stress.

Look at a difficult issue that comes your way as a positive challenge that will make you stronger. Changing your mindset will help you and your peace of mind.

If you are feeling consistently anxious and your anxiety is interfering with your day-to-day activities, reach out to your primary care physician or a mental health professional.

Evangelist \i-'van-jə-list\

One who announces Good News, particularly the message of the gospel. Often refers exclusively to the four gospel writers Mark, Matthew, Luke, and John. The New Testament also uses this term in reference to Philip, the deacon, and Timothy, a worker with Paul.

CONTEXT

Evangelizers take on the "smell of the sheep" and the sheep are willing to hear their voice. —*Pope Francis, Evangelii Guadium*

We are all **evangelists**, but we almost always **evangelize** about the wrong things. —*Matthew Kelly*

Saint Juan Diego, the peasant to whom Our Lady of Guadalupe appeared, is essentially the **evangelizer** of an entire hemisphere. *—USCCB.org*

WHY IT MATTERS

All Christians are summoned to the role of **evangelists**, a term first used in reference to the gospel writers in the third century. As followers of Jesus, our common vocation is to bring Good News to the poor, sick, lonely, imprisoned, and socially marginalized. The words of the four primary **evangelists**—Mark, Matthew, Luke, and John—instruct us in the mission we're invited to share.

From *Evangelii Nuntiandi* (Evangelization in the Modern World): The world is calling for **evangelizers** to speak to it of a God whom the **evangelists** themselves should know and be familiar with [122].

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

What's an evangelist?

Evangelist translates from Greek as "messenger of good tidings." All baptized persons are called to be such messengers. Isaiah speaks of the "beautiful feet" of those who bring Good News. Ephesians describes apostles, prophets, and **evangelists** as central players in the church. Biblically, **evangelist** is not an exclusive term.

By the third century, the formal list of **evangelists** is reduced to the four gospel writers, Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. They concretized the Good News the church would proclaim going forward.

By the fourth century, the symbology of the four **evangelists** became standardized as man, lion, ox, and eagle. Facing the four directions, these extraordinary creatures are four and yet unified in movement. They also burn like hot coals. Matthew, whose gospel emphasizes Jesus' humanity, is represented by the man. Mark highlights Jesus' divinity and kingship, so is identified as the lion. Luke holds up the sacrificial role of Jesus and so becomes the ox. John is the eagle as his gospel soars with a transcendent perspective on Jesus as the Christ.

GOSPEL MEDITATION:

April 21, 2024 4th Sunday of Easter

Recently I was with my little dog Libby at a retreat center in the Arizona desert. I sat in a chair near a ravine filled with shrubs. Unbeknownst to me, Libby wandered down there and disappeared. Suddenly an animal's wild shriek erupted from the area. Without thinking, I bolted down into the ravine fully expecting to see coyotes, javelinas, or rattlesnakes. I didn't care. I desperately wanted to get Libby out of there, without any self-regard. Before I could face whatever danger lay hidden, my dog blissfully trotted out from an entirely different area, utterly unaware that I had (quite heroically) just placed my life on the line.

When the adrenaline wore off, I thought to myself: how far would I have been willing to go to save her? I don't know. But I do know, if I had literally died, my friends and family would have certainly thought me insane for dying for a dog. No offense, Libby.

How passionately Jesus wants us to know him and his willingness to die for us! This week he says, **"I know my own and my own know me,"** and **"I lay down my life for the sheep."** Here we encounter an insanely excessive love for us. Christianity is a relationship and not simply a religion or ethical code. In Jesus, God rescues and saves us. He laid down his life for you and me — and he has taken it up again. So often we are like Libby — blissfully ignorant of the reality of both our spiritual danger and his saving love. This Easter season, the risen Jesus calls us to be more conscious than ever before about his love. He never ceases to lay down his life for us.
