The Touch of Christ

For a long time, I didn't understand why the virtual Masses of the pandemic were so wearisome to me. Theoretically, shouldn't it be a tired mother's dream, fulfilling her Sunday obligation from the couch, not having to worry how much noise the kids are making?

But it wasn't. Seeing Mass without experiencing it left me hungry. It left me starving.

Then a wise priest explained it to me. "Watching virtual Mass is like taking a virtual shower," he said.

Grace might not be something we can see with our eyes, but it is very much something that is transmitted physically. Jesus has a human body for a reason. He needs to touch people.

We see that nowhere more clearly than in this Gospel. The crowds are pressing on him, everyone trying to get close, everyone trying to share his space. The hemorrhaging woman claws her way through, desperate to make physical contact with him, any part of him, even his cloak. The synagogue official begs Jesus to come and "lay hands" on his daughter, knowing that this is the only way for her to survive. He doesn't ask for Jesus' good thoughts or approving gaze. He knows that isn't what he needs.

In the Gospels, Jesus saves people chiefly through his own touch because he wants to show us — you and me, sitting in the pews — something very important about how we are saved.

But where do you and I find the touch of Jesus Christ? Where do you and I find salvation?

It's in the water flowing over the infant's forehead. It's in the Host dissolving on our tongues. It's in the oil that is pressed to the skin of the confirmand, the dying man, and the brand-new priest. It's in the embrace of the newly married couple. It's in the extended hand of the priest as he says, "Your sins are forgiven."

It's still here, two thousand years later. It's still waiting for us to reach out and grasp it.

Dear Fellow Parishioners,

Happy New Year! Yes, you read that correctly. Tomorrow, July 1st, we begin the new fiscal year here at Our Lady of the Wayside and across the archdiocese. Along with the New Year comes a new, recently completed annual parish budget. After many hours of calculations, deliberations and number crunching we have managed to produce a **balanced budget**.

To accomplish balancing the budget, we have a very significant 'ask' of you, our faithful parishioners.

We are asking for each family to increase their weekly offering by \$6.

We currently have approximately 2,050 families registered. 1,000 of these actively support the parish via weekly envelopes or online giving. If all 2,050 families were to contribute an additional \$6 per week, the parish would realize a \$639,600 gain, which would result in a surplus of \$315,000 – money we would invest and hold for future needs. On the other hand, if only the current 1,000 families that support our parish increase their offering, the parish would see an **increase of \$312,000**, the **exact amount** we need to balance the budget. If you are not contributing now and choose to start, we would be most grateful.

I fully realize we are living in a time of rising prices. The demand for our monies is greater than in the past. It is no different in running our parish. Everything we need to efficiently operate the parish is also increasing. The Parish's only true source of income is the Sunday offerings made by you our faithful parishioners.

In the six months I have had the privilege of being your Operations Director I have tried to counsel and advise Fr. Arthur on the best ways to most efficiently utilize our funds. The cost of day-to-day operations is increasing, and we still have challenges ahead. Our special projects, long overdue (bathrooms in middle school, windows in rectory, raising of sidewalks, landscaping), are costing more than originally budgeted. And the list of things still needing attention is growing too. For example, we have nine more bathrooms in the grade school (dating back to the 1950s!) that need updating. Based on feedback we've received, I believe our parish is headed in a positive direction. Many parishioners have commented that they like seeing the improvements we are making.

Taking all of this into account, I also believe that YOU, the parishioners of Our Lady of the Wayside, will step up and support us in this quest. Is it not worth \$6 more a week to continue to see our parish grow?

Thank you for your ongoing and increased support of our Parish.

8 Summertime Safety Must-Dos

As summer kicks off and children of all ages spend more time outdoors, it's important to keep safety top of mind. I've witnessed many preventable injuries over the years, with many occurring in the summer months when children are out of school and more active. Here are my top tips for summertime safety so you and your family can create fun and safe memories this year.

- 1. Wear a helmet: We often associate helmet use with bike riding and forget that other activities can also cause head injuries. Skull fractures, concussions and scalp lacerations are injuries that can occur without proper equipment. Wear a helmet and protective gear when riding bikes, scooters, 4-wheelers/ATVs, segways, skateboards and hoverboards.
- 2. Use proper swimming equipment: Choking, drowning and near-drowning events are unfortunately all too common. Pool accessories like noodles, inflatable rafts and arm floaties are great for games and activities, but they should not be used as floatation devices. When swimming in open spaces and large bodies of water, don't underestimate the effects of wind gusts on currents and waves, which can overpower even the most experienced swimmers. For young and inexperienced swimmers, use life vests. Never swim alone and choose bodies of water with lifeguards on duty, making sure you remain visible to them.
- 3. Wear sunscreen: Sunburns, blistering and sun rashes (photodermatitis) are not only painful results of sun exposure but can have long-term consequences. Use SPF sunscreen and reapply during the day as needed. For young infants, use light protective clothing, sun hats and swimsuits with long sleeves.
- 4. Prevent bug bites: Mosquito and other insect bites can cause local allergic reactions or skin infections, also known as cellulitis. Use insect repellants and protective clothing when going out in wooded areas or with many insects. Some tick bites can lead to Lyme disease. If your child gets bitten by a tick, remove it immediately. Monitor them for early signs of Lyme disease, which include a red target-like rash (erythema migrans), fever, chills, and joint and muscle pain. See your physician if these symptoms occur.
- 5. Stay hydrated: Inadequate fluid intake can quickly lead to dehydration, especially in hot summer weather. Signs of dehydration include headaches, lightheadedness, dizziness and fainting. Children need between 4-8 cups of water each day depending on their age. Guided water bottles often help children stay on track with their daily intake.
- **6. Use caution on playground equipment**: Improper and unsupervised use of playground equipment can lead to falls, head injuries, wrist fractures (buckle fractures), ankle injuries (sprains, fractures), collarbone/clavicle fractures and cuts/lacerations.
- 7. Stay away from fireworks: Without proper handling and training, fireworks can be extremely dangerous and cause permanent damage including burns, finger injuries, amputations and fires. You can enjoy fireworks this summer by attending fireworks displays, summer festivals and carnivals.
- 8. Be careful at that cookout: Cooking comes with dangers, especially laceration injuries from knives and burns from grills, open flames, hot liquid spills, oil and grease. The best way to involve children in meal preparation is to have them assist with cooking away from the heat source. Have children participate in mixing/stirring foods and preparation tasks in the kitchen. Avoid food that has been sitting out for long periods of time, especially creamand mayonnaise-based foods, raw food, seafood and cold cut sandwiches. Not properly chilling and storing foods can lead to food-borne illnesses that can present as vomiting and/or diarrhea, upset stomach and abdominal pain.

Synoptic \'sə-'näp-tik\

From Greek for "seen together," sharing a common view or perspective; specifically, relating to the Gospels of Mark, Matthew, and Luke, because, unlike the Gospel of John, which is 90 percent unique, the three **synoptic** gospels present similar parables, sayings, and episodes.

WHY IT MATTERS

The gospels comprise the mystery of faith in Jesus Christ, whose entrance into human history confirms that God, who is love, is with us to free us from sin and death and lead us to everlasting life. Believers are charged to bring this "Good News" to all the world. Though the **synoptic** gospels tell the same stories or present truths in a similar way, they are meant for different audiences at different times. Appreciating the cumulative testimony of all four gospels enables us to fulfill our mission as church.

From *Dei Verbum* (Dogmatic Constitution on Divine Revelation): The sacred authors wrote the four gospels, selecting some things from the many which had been handed on by word of mouth or in writing, reducing some of them to a synthesis, explaining some things in view of the situation of their churches but always in such fashion that they told us the honest truth about Jesus.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

What's the difference between "gospel" and the "gospels"?

Our word *gospel* comes from the Anglo-Saxon "god-spell," good tidings. In Greek it's *evangelion*, used to describe the proclamation of Jesus. The gospel isn't what Jesus says. It's the teachings about Jesus—Incarnation, Crucifixion, and Resurrection—which reveal him as God's Son. Plurally, "gospels" are books that tell how the gospel (Good News) came to be.

Saint Paul frequently refers to "God's gospel" and boils the evangelion down to a single idea: "Christ crucified." That the world is saved from sin and death by the death of the Messiah seemed like foolishness to Greeks and a theological obstacle to Jews. Yet Paul refused to back down from the "absurdity" of the cross.

Among the **synoptic** writers, Mark calls his book "The gospel of Jesus Christ." To Matthew, the Good News is that God has seized power over evil and begun a new reign. Luke emphasizes "glad tidings to the poor." John doesn't use the term *gospel*, but his message of God's Incarnate Word has the same implications.

GOSPEL MEDITATION:

June 30, 2024

13th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Sin isn't given its due these days. Downplaying sin is dangerous. But there is also another spiritual misstep in which we make way too big a deal out of sin. It happens, for example, when we persistently wonder if our confessed sins are "really" forgiven, or suspiciously ponder what God "really" thinks about us, behind His merciful face. Or when someone returns to Church, and we question whether his or her conversion was genuine. Or when we commit some sin and put on a sad face for days, thinking, "Maybe my sins are too great for God to deal with." God save us from that attitude!

Well, he does just that, this week, in the raising of Jairus' daughter. The dead twelve-year-old's house is filled with a spirit of excessive moaning and groaning, tumultuous weeping and wailing. They even laugh at Jesus in a mocking tone. It's shocking how easy it is for him to raise the dead child. It is equivalent to gently waking a kid from a light nap. And then he sends her off to get some lunch. No big whoop. The overactive drama is actually part of the problem, and removing it is a key part of the miracle.

Friends, sin can and does kill, but Jesus is always ready and able to raise us back to life, often without much hullabaloo. His ease of forgiving should never be a pretext for presumption, minimizing sin, or taking lightly the cost he pays for our sins on the cross. But for God's sake, we often need Jesus to put out the weepers and wailers. He's the Lord. And remember, the girl is not dead, she's just sleeping.
