

A Deserted Place

In one of my favorite shows, "Parks and Recreation," there is a scene where one of the characters, Jerry, is tasked with stuffing hundreds of envelopes with flyers as part of his volunteer work for a local city council campaign.

Jerry's efficient, almost me-

chanical completion of the job amazes his coworkers, who gather to watch in awe while he folds, inserts, seals, and stamps — over and over again. After several hours, the huge pile of envelopes is finally ready for mailing ... and Jerry realizes that he has stuffed them all with the wrong piece of paper.

"I always say, it ain't government work unless you do it twice," he quips as he restarts the task.

In any work, no matter how worthy or fulfilling it is, there is a point where the task transforms into mere routine. It can happen with anything: ministry, marriage, parenthood, even prayer. There is no shame in this. It doesn't mean that we don't enjoy these pursuits or feel passion for the mission inherent in them.

It only means that we are human, and we get tired.

When the Apostles return from their travels, Jesus recognizes their exhaustion. He encourages them to "come away to a deserted place." He inhabits a human body, so he knows the weariness to which it is subject. He knows what it is to be tired, to be hungry. He knows that it's hard to do the work when your body is failing you.

It's important for us to recognize those times when Jesus is calling us to a deserted place — and it's important for us to follow him there, even if we are pursued by feelings of doubt and guilt, just as the Apostles were followed by crowds hungry for their ministry.

Solitude is not selfishness. Contemplation is not idleness. To withdraw does not mean to run away.

The work we do — whatever it is — deserves our whole strength. If we have lost that, there is only one place we are sure to find it again.

Our Lady of the Wayside Making a Difference in East Africa



Our Lady of the Wayside student council and sponsor/Spanish teacher **Joe Nigliazzo** rallied before Summer break to do missionary work for Uganda, East Africa. Using funds raised in the "Change for Change" student council campaign, students and parents in the community are now stepping up to offer helpful assistance with a big job – finding a way to transport and distribute 300 hand-sewn dresses benefiting girls in Kasese, Uganda.

Wayside's Senior Deacon, **Don Grossnickle**, and the MAAPFoundation have been working on several mission projects in the Kasese Diocese of Uganda. This beautiful dress sharing partnership was made possible through collaboration and kindness lessons learned in the Wayside school curriculum and at mass.



The donated dresses were hand-made at St. Mary of Vernon parish by 30 sewing group women led by new OLW parishioner, **Sharon Rudy**. Sharon passed along the dresses crafted at her former parish to Deacon Don. She is happy knowing that the gift of a new dress made by US friends might be uplifting to at least some of the 20,000 Ugandans who recently became refugees when their homes were destroyed by rains and the deadly mudslides that followed.

Of special note, this is the THIRD major mission project supported by OLW teacher Joe Nigliazzo. It began several years ago when Joe and his mom, Mindy, and dad, Dave, helped Deacon Don take to the streets to collect donations to kick-start his African Ministry. Wayside students have generously collected "Change for Change," twice previously, as missionaries. They helped purchase livestock for a farm project in 2020 and supported making clothing for girls in 2022.



Joe Nigliazzo, OLW students and parents, and parishioners like Sharon Rudy continually exemplify the spirit of discipleship and evangelization, embracing efforts in Africa to help alleviate human suffering. Every act of kindness brings Christ's love to lift up someone in trouble.












We Are in the LOOP!

Our Lady of the Wayside Church has had a hearing loop since 2018. The system has been designed to cover all seating areas in the church and will allow any hearing aid equipped with a **telecoil** to listen directly to our PA system. This results in very clear sound to the hearing aid and makes speech very easy to understand.

Many hearing aids already have a t-coil (also called a telephone coil, telecoil, or audio coil) installed and simply need to be activated by your hearing care professional. To make use of the system, **just ask your** hearing care professional a few questions:

- 1. Do my hearing aids have a t-coil?
- 2. If yes, Can you please activate it?

 If no, do my hearing aids have a compatible streaming device to connect to the loop?
- 3. Please show me how to put my hearing aids into "t-coil mode"?







Natural Ways to Prevent Motion Sickness

Traveling can be full of memories that will last forever. But for some travelers, motion sickness awaits the journey whether you fly or drive.

"Motion sickness, also known as seasickness or carsickness, is caused by a disturbance of the inner ear resulting in spatial orientation and impaired sense of balance and equilibrium," explains Katie Swanson, a family medicine nurse practitioner at Advocate Health Care. "When the eyes, inner ears, muscles, and joints deliver conflicting information, your brain does not know whether you are stationary or moving. Your brain's confused reaction causes the feeling of motion sickness."

Symptoms can include nausea, vomiting, headache, increased saliva production, irritability, dizziness, cold sweats, rapid breathing and pale skin. According to Swanson, motion sickness usually resolves when the repetitive motion stops.

She also explains that some people are more susceptible to motion sickness, including children ages 2-12, women on their menstrual cycle, pregnant people, and those who experience

To prevent the uncomfortable sensation, Swanson recommends:

- Drinking plenty of water
- Rolling down the window when driving
- Getting fresh air

migraines.

- Facing the direction, you are traveling
- Putting down the phone, tablet or book while in the car
- Taking an over-the-counter antihistamine or using a scopolamine skin patch prior to travel

If you experience persistent motion sickness, there are "additional medications, which require a prescription from your primary care provider, including promethazine, meclizine, and ondansetron," Swanson adds.

For non-medication treatment options, Swanson advises:

- Trying aromatherapy
- Facing forward with air vents turned towards your face
- Sucking on ginger or peppermint candies
- Sitting at the front of the vehicle
- Taking a nap
- Focusing on the horizon

Prevention and treatment will vary for children based on their age and tolerance. "Children are sometimes reluctant to take medication so non-pharmacologic methods of treatment or prevention may be best," Swanson says. "Successful interventions for children include deep breathing, singing, having the child close his or her eyes, or applying a cool cloth over their head."

When giving medication to children, be sure to follow the appropriate dosing.

"Motion sickness can be due to an underlying balance disorder, fluid in the ear, an infection or Meniere's disease," she adds. If you are concerned about frequent motion sickness, speak to your doctor.

GOSPEL MEDITATION:

July 21, 2024

16th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Burnout. Recent studies suggest that roughly two-thirds of doctors and nurses have signs of it. You probably know what burnout is: long-term stress leading to emotional exhaustion and a lack of a sense of personal accomplishment. Burnout can threaten anyone who tries to seriously serve and love others. How does our faith inform this challenging experience, and how do we find refreshment?

The apostles face something like burnout this week in Mark 6. They are run down from their missionary work, and Jesus says, "Come away by yourselves to a lonely place, and rest a while." For them, and for us, it takes humility to intentionally rest. It means the world can go on without us. It stings our pride to admit God is necessary and we are not. Choosing to leave our good work to be with him — whatever the cost — is an act of humble faith. And that trust in God begins to revive us.

But there's more to it. Hilariously, Mark tells us that throngs of needy people find out where the apostles are going and arrive ahead of them. Imagine the exasperation of the burnt-out apostles. "Can we please get a minute to ourselves? This is not healthy!" And Jesus seems to encourage the boundary violation by telling his frayed followers to feed the crowd. Look: once we move into humble rest, he calls us to more work, because we are made for love, not for rest. But Jesus does the vast bulk of the labor. He himself is the one who multiplies the small offering until everyone is satisfied.

What finally gives our heart rest isn't more vacation time. It's experiencing the super abundant generosity of God for us and those whom we serve.
