When people whisper, what they whisper usually is not flattering. It's also usually not accurate. If it was either of these things, it probably wouldn't have to be whispered.

"Stop murmuring among yourselves," Jesus tells the

community in today's Gospel, and I think I detect a hint of impatience in his voice — or is that just my own bias? Maybe, maybe not. But it's true that what they were whispering about wasn't particularly flattering, and it also wasn't very accurate: Did you hear what he said? That he's the bread of life?

Do they disbelieve, or are they simply confused? Resentful? Afraid? Overwhelmed? We don't know, but we do know that they're not bringing their questions into the open. They're whispering them, trading them secretly, like contraband candy.

We know this guy. Who does he think he is? Well, if you ask

And then we get to what is usually the true purpose of a whispered opinion: the desire to make oneself out as the correct and unchallenged judge of the matter at hand.

In many ways, we have become a Church of murmurers. Did you see what Bishop So-and-So said to Such-and-Such newspaper? Did you hear what Fr. Whatshisname said in his homily? Who does he think he is? Well, if you ask me...


Perhaps it was always this way, even before modern times. Perhaps this Gospel shows us that this is no new thing.

Today, we see Jesus respond to his sulking critics by drawing their attention back to the truth at the heart of his teaching. Everyone who listens to my Father and learns from him comes to me. And that is the end of their murmuring.

The truth is like a brick wall, and it knocks them over — or rather they, hurling themselves against it, knock themselves over.

When Should Teens Transition to a Primary Care Physician?

Is your child between the ages of 18 and 21? It may be time for you to transition them from their pediatrician to a primary care physician.

"Transition to adulthood is a crucial time for your teen," says Dr. Jayasri Dasar Raju, a family medicine physician with Advocate Health Care. "It is important to find a primary care physician whom they can trust and can continue to address their health care needs. This includes routine physicals, medication management or monitoring of chronic conditions."

Pediatricians are trained to treat teens, so it is completely fine for them to continue to see their pediatrician if they feel comfortable. When they are ready to make the transition, talk to their pediatrician and ask for suggestions from primary care physicians.

Here are some tips for making the transition:

- Start the discussion early. Talk to your teen's pediatrician about when the right time is to make the switch.
- Look for primary care physicians who are accepting new patients.
- Encourage your teen to self-manage their health care needs by getting involved in making decisions.
- Ask friends and family who may have gone through this process already for guidance. They may even have physician recommendations.



It is important for your teens to be part of their health care decision-making process by building their skills to understand their health needs.

Here are ways you can prepare your teen:

- By the time your teen reaches high school, let them have alone time with their health care provider to build self-advocacy.
- If your teen has a chronic health problem, make sure to talk to them about it so they understand it.
- If your teen takes regular medications, make sure they know the names of them and why they are taking them.

When finding a primary care physician, choose someone that you and your teen trust and whom they feel comfortable with.

Now that your teen is an adult, it is important they are vocal in what they need and want from their health care provider. I suggest using trustworthy online resources that help guide you on getting the preventive services your teen needs," says Dr. Dasar Raju.

Hyperdulia \'hī-pər-'dü-lē-ə\

Literally, "a greater service"; it refers to the special reverence Catholics show to the Blessed Virgin Mary. God alone is worshipped and adored (latria), while the saints are honored (dulia). As the Mother of God, Mary is uniquely honored with a higher reverence, or **hyperdulia**, than the rest of the saints.

WHY IT MATTERS

Two affiliations loom large for Catholics that distinguish us from any other brand of Christian: our relationship with Mary and with the pope. Getting Mary right is therefore vital. She's not a fourth wheel in the Trinity, and she's not just another saint in the celestial realm. Mary is Mother of God and Mother of the Church. As Christ-bearer, she models for us what true discipleship is. Let's give Mary her due!

From the Apostolic Exhortation of Pope Paul VI, *Marialis Cultus*: The Church in spirit and truth adores the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, venerates with special love Mary the most holy Mother of God, and honors with religious devotion the memory of the martyrs and the other saints."

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

Why do Catholics believe in Mary's Assumption into heaven?

The Assumption was formally declared as dogma in 1950 by Pope Pius XII, but as early as the third century the tradition of Mary's "transitus" recounted her bodily reception into heaven. The theological argument for the Assumption is one of "fittingness." Mary is the Ark of God's new covenant in Christ. She was preserved from sin for this end (her Immaculate Conception) and should not undergo the corruption of death. Her body, given over to God's purposes in the divine plan of salvation, became a vessel too sacred to be discarded or forgotten.

Perhaps a more humanly compelling argument arose in the wake of the 20th century's two brutal world wars. Pius XII surveyed the ghastly indignities suffered by humanity and saw an opportunity to teach emphatically that God cares what happens to our mortal flesh. Mary's exaltation brings "clearly to the notice of all persons" our common destiny as vessels of divine life precious in God's sight.

What Mary endured, we can endure; what Mary achieved, we can achieve. She is the "guide, strength, and consolation of our mortal life," said Pope Pius XII in a prayer in honor of the Assumption.

GOSPEL MEDITATION:

August 11, 2024

19th Sunday in Ordinary Time

This week we hear Jesus say, "He that believes in me, has eternal life" (John 6:47). These straightforward words, uttered by human lips, sound — how to put this? — insane. Who could possibly say such a thing? Jesus says things that are so high, so demanding, so beyond our capacity to fathom, we hardly know what to do with them and (if you're like me), they usually go in one ear and out the other. So, let us ask: how can believing in him lead to eternal life?

To believe in something means not just to acknowledge its existence, but also to orient yourself entirely to it. If a football player believes in his team, it means he puts his life totally at the service of that goal. If a student believes in her dream to become a doctor, she gives everything she has to her studies and preparation for her MCAT test. Belief means to move boldly toward something we love, and trust is possible to attain.

What is the highest possible good at which we can aim? It is God himself, the gift of eternal life without end. Jesus has made this "good" possible in and through his human nature. To believe in him means to have him as our ultimate goal. This week let's believe the truth of these words and make practical decisions to orient ourselves toward what we see available in him: eternal life.
